

SPONSORED SUCCESSFUL COOKING SCHOOL

The cooking school in the Town Hall on Thursday afternoon, sponsored by Paisley branch of the Women's Institute, through the courtesy of J. R. McArthur, proved to be a most successful affair, and some 200 ladies of the village and district attended the demonstrations and lecture.

Miss Elaine Collett, home economist for a stove manufacturer, was in charge of the school, and demonstrated the proper preparation and baking of a number of tasty and attractive dishes. Her manner of explanation was bright and breezy, and with her ready wit, the speaker held the full attention of her audience. She employed both electric and propane gas ranges in her demonstrations, and explained to her listeners the advantages of each method.

A number of valuable door prizes were given away during the afternoon, as were all of the dishes prepared by Miss Collett. Proceeds of the cooking school will enrich the Women's Institute treasury.
