Thompson in 1911, they had farmed near Paisley in Elderslie Township. In 1935 they retired, removing to Paisley. Mrs. Thompson was a member of the Church of the Ascension (Anglican) and a highly respected resident of the village, where she had a wide circle of friends.

Surviving besides her husband are three daughters: (Anna) Mrs. Arthur Duddle of Paisley; (Ida) Mrs. Wallace Nelson of Walkerton; Miss Hazel Thompson of Waterloo; and four sons: Albert and George Thompson, in Alberta; Joseph Thompson, Saugeen Township, and Harvey Thompson of Chicago; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Palmateer of Westchester, Pa., and (Margaret) Mrs. H. M. Anderson of Meaford; and 15 grandchildren. A brother, William Anstead, predeceased her.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon, with service at the Stoddart funeral home conducted by Rev. Robert Carson, rector of the Church of the Ascension. Burial took place in Paisley Cemetery.
