


Mae Oatman Cutting the 90th Anniversay Cake


The Township of Norwich gave a piece of land adjacent to the community park to Springford Women's Institute for building a new hall. The new facility was constructed by October, 1988, with funds from a Wintario grant, Norwich Township, Agricultural Society and a generous community. The Women's Institute furnished the kitchen and continue to maintain it to the present time. A fund-raising group and the Women's Institute combined their efforts to raise funds and the balance was paid off by 1991. The parking lot was paved soon after that. A Management Board was organized with three of its members coming from the Women's Institute.

George Wilcox, the founder of rural mail delivery in Canada, was honoured at a special event at the hall. His work is remembered with an historical plaque located in front of the hall.
