## Press Search For Missing

Search for two men still missing in the explosion which tore open Saskatchewan Pool Terminal 4A last Wednesday was being pressed with increased intensity today as a swarm of clean-up workers moved in on the wrecked elevator.

Six hundred tons of screenings were removed from the hold of the Colonial Steamship Lines vessel Bayton over the weekend, sifted and loaded onto a barge.

Last shovel-fuls of the cargo were taken out this morning at the Port Arthur Shipbuilding Company and no sign of the body of Fred Zakunsky, 44, elevator oilman, was found. Zakunsky was believed eating lunch with Peter Dyc, whose body was found on the deck of the

Bayton. Two boats and crews, under direction of city police, meanwhile, were dragging the slip of Pool 4A today. Their search had produced nothing—at the noon hour.

About 60 demolition workers under Mike Mills of Fort William attacked wreckage around the terminal with heavy cranes, bulldozers and welding torches, while a search party—at great risk to

## Sentence Given For Panok Murder

George (Gregor) Hladiy, 38, of Fort William, convicted of murdering Joseph Panok, a newcomer to Canada, was sentenced to hang at Port Arthur Tuesday, Dec. 9, by Mr. Justice D. P. J. Kelly, Toronto, presiding jurist at the fall assizes of the Supreme Court of Canada here Saturday afternoon.

The convicted railway section hand reacted much the same as he did during the five-day trial before a 12-man jury. His demeanor seemed to be one of perplexity. As soon as the death sentence was translated to him, the jail guards snapped handcuffs on him and led him out of the court room.

Mr. Justice Kelly thanked the jury for their trying duty and commended them on their decision.

The jury retired at 12.55 p.m. Saturday to consider the words of Defence Counsel Hugh Cunningham and Crown Attorney P. V. Ibbetson and the charge of His Lordship, Mr. Cunningham and Mr. Ibbetson spend about 35 minutes each in
