## Hlady Goes To Gallows "Resigned"

George (Gregor) Hlady paid the price this morning for having committed murder. The blond-haired immigrant, who was in his thirties, was hanged at 12.18 a.m. in District Jail for the July murder in Port William of Josef Panok, a fellow immigrant.

Hlady is reported to have gone to the gallows "very quietly" and "resigned", and he had not asked for anything special as a last request.

He left his cell on the second floor of the jail shortly after midnight. In the company of police representatives from Port Arthur, Fort William, the Ontario Provincial Police and jail guards, he walked to the execution room.

He looked steadily at the rope on the gallows until the black hood was placed over his head. At 12.18 the trap doors were sprung, and his body fell a distance of eight feet. A few minutes later, Dr. C. E. Baker pronounced Hlady dead, and the body was then inspected by a coroner's jury of five.

### BURIED TODAY

The remains were later buried in the Ukrainian-Catholic Cemetery on Arthur street.

Rev. Father B. G. Shumay, of the Church of the Transfiguration, Fort William, who was with Hlady many times since the immigrant was arrested, last year, joined the condemned man at eight o'clock last night.

He reported that "Hlady had been a very religious man and had been well prepared for his death."

The Father added that "he went to his death very bravely. He was a brave man." He said that "Hlady came of a good family, and when he was first arrested, he used to feel badly that he wouldn't be seeing his parents again. Towards the end, however, he had resigned himself and was spiritually prepared."

Father Joseph Kutney, the Ukrainian pastor in Port Arthur, later joined Hlady and Father Shumay, and both priests were with the condemned man to the end.

The carrying out of the death sentence last night was the first official hanging in Port Arthur since January, 1948, when Charles Martin, a bush worker, was hanged for several murders.
