POLICE COURT

Only two drunks appeared in the
local police court this morning. Wil-
liam Fox, an old offender, was ar-
rested at an early hour this morn-
ing when found drunk and incapable.
He was taken to the station but had
been there only a short time when he
was seized with convulsions. Doctor
McIntosh was called and had him
removed to McKellar hospital.

Magistrate Doble had rather a busy
morning in the Port Arthur court
today. Alfred Doran appeared on a
charge of breaking into a warehouse
at the rear of Smiley's grocery and
stealing therefrom about four hun-
dred pounds of butter. The theft was
committed last January. A compan-
ion in the theft has not yet been
located, but the police expect to lo-
cate him shortly so the case was
remanded until March 25.

Lt. McCartney was fined \$10
and costs for pawning a violin which
he had borrowed from Fred Adams,
of Port Arthur.

Five drunks who were assessed the
usual \$1 and \$2 and costs, com-
pleted the docket.

H. R. Findley, or Gillespie, as he
is also known, the Logus "lieuten-
ant," was sentenced to serve six
months in jail by Magistrate Pail-
ling in the local police court yester-
day afternoon. Gillespie was also
sentenced to serve six months by
Magistrate Doble, of Port Arthur,
on Wednesday, so that already his
sentence amounts to one year. He
has yet to be tried in Sudbury and
Toronto and probably other cities in
the east.

M. Kwiatkowski appeared before
Magistrate Palling yesterday charged
with unlawfully stealing from the
Merchants' bank, Winnipeg, the sum
of \$130. He was also charged with
forging the name of Mike Mykichuk,
a Winnipeg depositor of the bank's.
He was found guilty on both charges
and was sentenced to serve two years
in jail. He pleaded guilty to the
charges.

HAD FUSE AND PISTOL

The only luggage carried by the
prisoners, consisted of two small
bandbags, which contained, besides
wearing apparel, a loaded revolver
and a short piece of fuse such as is
used in exploding a charge of dynamite.
When questioned at the sta-
tion, they first claimed that they
were travelers for an automobile firm
in Detroit and were en route to Win-
nipeg. They later said, at least the
man called Stephen did, that he was
on his way to Winnipeg to pay a
friend who was located there, \$25
dollars which he owed him. Schmidt
attempted to confirm his compan-
ion's story by saying that he was
just traveling with him to keep him
company.

Schmidt also said, when asked
about his past history, that he had
been a cook on a tramp steamer run-
ning out of San Francisco, but had
left his ship to travel in the United
States. He claims to have met Ste-
phens in Detroit where the latter
says he has been living for the past
four years and has a wife and fam-
ily located there. Stephens ad-
mitted that he at one time belonged
to the German navy.

The two prisoners will come up
for a hearing probably next week be-
fore Magistrate Doble, and will likely
be sent up for trial before a judge
and jury next month.
