with five of their senior officials.
 are Standard Paving Limited of
 Toronto, Tomlinson Brothers Lim-
 ited of Winnipeg and Fort William
 and Bergmann Construction Co.
 Ltd. of West Hill, just east of
 Toronto.

These were among nine contract-
 ing firms whose books were seized
 by provincial police two months
 ago.

The Bergmann firm was named
 twice. A subsidiary of the Tom-
 linson firm, Tomlinson Brothers
 (Eastern) Limited, also was
 named.

No amounts were given in the
 warrants, which were issued in
 three groups.

The first group named Standard
 Paving Limited, E. Birdall, com-
 pany official, Mr. Nelson and Mr.
 Petursson. It accused them of con-
 spiring in York county and else-
 where in the province from 1949
 to 1953 to defraud the government.
 The trial will be held in Toronto.

Tomlinson Brothers Limited,
 company official C. W. Taylor, and
 Arthur M. Mills, suspended chief
 of the Fort William division of the
 highways department, are accused
 of conspiring with each other and
 with Petursson in the Thunder Bay
 district and elsewhere to defraud
 the government. The trial will be
 in Fort William.

ONTARIO COUNTY CASES

Another group of warrants charg-
 ing conspiracy names the Berg-
 mann Construction Co. Ltd.; Wal-
 ter Bergmann, head of the com-
 pany; C. M. P. O. J. Patterson,
 John A. West; Donald S. Patterson,
 suspended Huntsville divisional en-
 gineer of the highways depart-
 ment; William Leonard Bradin,
 highways department instrument
 man at Huntsville; and Nelson.
 The alleged offence is said to have
 been committed in Ontario county
 and elsewhere in the province and
 the trial will be at Whitby.

Still another group charging con-
 spiracy in Ontario county names
 the Bergmann company, Mr. Berg-
 mann, West, Nelson, and Harry
 Phipps, retired assistant construc-
 tion engineer of the provincial high-
 ways department at Fort William.
 It accused them of conspiring with
 each other and with Mills.

Mills had already been com-
 mitted for trial on previous
 charges that he authorized pay-
 ment for work never done and that
 he was a party to falsifying rec-
 ords to avert suspicions.

FIVE OTHERS AWAIT TRIAL

Four other suspended employees
 of the highways department,
 Thomas Ayres, 56, of Guelph,
 Douglas Cutting, 41, and Donald
 Gandler, 30, of Fort William and
 G. W. Turner, 29, of Cochrane, also
 have been committed to stand trial
 on conspiracy charges.

They were charged among other
 things with putting imaginary
 trucks to work with the department
 and slicing up \$7,820 made in pay-
 ment for them.

The books of a number of con-
 tracting companies were seized for
 examination as a result of the in-
 vestigations. Federal payments for
 work on the Fort William section
 of the Trans-Canada highway have
 been suspended until the provin-
 cial investigation is completed.

A private firm of accounting ex-
 perts has been called in and the
 government caused an 11-man se-
 lect committee of the legislature
 to be appointed to go into the ir-
 regularities.

It has yet to meet.
 The committee is scheduled to
 meet next Monday. It has been
 told that on that day it can expect
 to receive reports of the investiga-
 tions being conducted by the
 J. D. Woods and Gordon Limited
 firm of management consultants
 and by provincial auditor Harvey
 Cotnam.

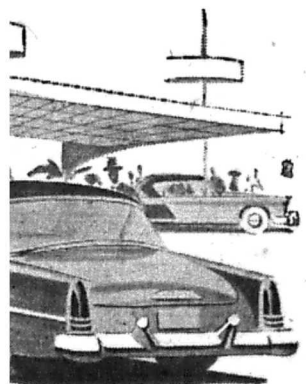

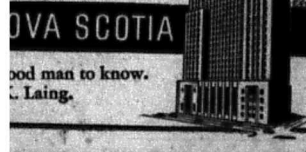
