Board Defers Decisions on Zone By-laws

Decision on proposed changes

Tomlinson Is Charged

W. S. Tomlinson, 42-year-old vice
president of the Tomlinson Bros.,
Ltd., Port Arthur contractors,
was charged with highways depart-
ment contracts conspiracy in Fort
William police court this morning
and remanded to May 31 by Magis-
trate William Davies, with cash
bail set at \$10,000.

The company vice president, one
of four individuals and two con-
struction firms named in the same
conspiracy indictment, flew to the
lakehead this morning from British
Columbia, to face the charge. He
has retained G. Arthur Martin,
Q.C., of Toronto, who was repre-
sented in court by T. P. Callon, of
Port Arthur.

Bernard Black, assistant crown

Union Refuses To Support Ship Strikers

MONTREAL (CP) — Striking
crew members of the British
freighters Cibou and Shelldrake
learned by a telegram Tuesday
they will have no support from
their union—the National Union of
Seamen of Great Britain—in their
fight for higher wages.

The 30-man Cibou crew struck
Monday partly to enforce their own
wage demands and partly in sym-
pathy with the 18 Shelldrake sea-
men, arrested two days previously
for allegedly refusing their cap-
tain's orders to put to sea.

A spokesman for the Cibou men
—aboard the cold, unlit collier—
said they had only \$3 among them
and some had not eaten since Mon-
day night. Captain D. S. Whittet,
acting in the interests of the ship-
owners, locked up the Cibou's food
supplies and ordered the boilers
closed down.

"We'd all be better off in jail,"
the crew's spokesman said, "but
the company has decided to wait
until a verdict is returned in the
Shelldrake case." He said the un-
ion's telegram indicated it had
"washed its hands of the Shell-
drake affair."

PAID \$90 A MONTH

British seamen are paid less
than \$90 a month compared to
union minimum of \$204 for Cana-
dian seamen.

The Shelldrake and Cibou ply
Canadian coastal waters during the
summer, and crewmen claimed
they cannot live at Canadian price
levels and maintain their families
in Britain.

The Shelldrake's crew appeared
briefly in court Tuesday and the
case was postponed until today at
the request of their lawyer.
