companies whose books had been seized by provincial police two months ago. Government officials said Monday it is not likely that any further warrants will be issued.

Eight of the 11 men charged Monday have been arrested. Fettersson is federal supervising engineer at Victoria, B.C. The warrants for W. S. Tomlinson, who lives in Fort William, and Birdsall have not yet been served.

**HELD AT LAKEHEAD**

Taylor and Arthur M. Mills, former division engineer at Fort William who is named in three charges, were arrested at Fort William Monday. The former division engineer has already been committed to higher court on charges of trust and fraud. The charges are slated to be heard at the fall assizes in Fort William.

Nelson was arrested at Fort Hope Bergmann and West at Pickering, Patterson and Bredin at Huntsville. Nelson, West, Bergmann, Patterson and Bredin appeared before a justice of the peace in Whitby Monday and were released on bail ranging from \$3,000 to \$10,000.

Mills and Taylor appeared in police court in Fort William Monday and were remanded to May 31. Bail of \$5,000 was continued for Mills and bail for Taylor was set at \$5,000.

Those charged at Standard Paving will appear in a Toronto court; Tomlinson in Fort William and Bergmann and Nelson in Whitby.

Four sets of irregularities were charged against the companies and highway employees; three in Fort William and one in Huntsville. The Standard and Tomlinson companies are involved in the Fort William charges and Bergmann in the Huntsville division of the department.

**WHY UNREVEALED**

A source close to the investigation said the amount involved in the charges covered by the warrants was not revealed because the charge is conspiracy rather than a straight fraud count.

A select committee set up by the Ontario legislature to augment investigations into reports of irregularities will meet next Monday.

Suspicion first arose during a routine provincial government audit last fall. It resulted in the suspension of Mills and four other highways department employees in that division. The five still are awaiting trial.

Estimates of how much money is involved in the irregularities have ranged as high as several million dollars but the only official statement has been made by Highways Minister Doucett who said last fall he did not think the amount involved would exceed \$20,000.
