If a private individual sells an ap-  
pliance which is not rebuilt but is op-  
erating as good as new he may

built model. But on such a sale a  
warranty in favor of the purchaser is  
implied, effective for periods varying  
from 30 days to six months according  
to the type of appliance sold. If with-  
in the effective period of the warrant-  
ty the purchaser finds that repairs  
are necessary for the proper opera-  
tion of the appliance purchased, he  
may make a request in writing to the  
seller to have the required repairs  
made.

Under the order, the seller is re-  
quired to make these repairs or re-  
placements at his own expense.

## Trio Hanged

who held burning newspapers to her  
limbs and finally held her on a hot  
stove in an effort to make her re-  
veal the hiding place of her money  
in her Flanders, Ont., home, 85 miles  
east of here.

At their trial last September, the  
men admitted they had gone to the  
woman's home in search of a large  
sum of money—some \$40,000—which  
they believed hidden there. They ap-  
plied the torture when they failed to  
find it.

### Daughter at Scene

As the hour of execution drew near,  
a few people gathered on the street  
across from the jail. Among them was  
Bernice Casnig, daughter of Mrs.  
Jamieson. She sat with another un-  
identified woman on the steps of a  
private residence facing the jail.

Police patrolled the jail entrance,  
and when a news photographer snap-  
ped a flashlight bulb, taking a picture  
of Mrs. Casnig, the officers cleared  
the street. All persons were ordered  
away, police escorting them for two  
blocks.

Newspapermen were not allowed to  
witness the hanging. They were for-  
ced to move from in front of the jail.

Shortly before 1 a.m. a black flag—  
the symbol of death—was run up,  
showing that the sentence of the court  
had been carried out.

The Skrypnik brothers went to the  
gallows shortly after 12:30 a.m. and 20  
minutes later Schmidt, who had been  
called the ringleader of the torture  
slayers, died on the scaffold.

Sheriff C. L. Sundin of Fort Frances,  
who earlier had ordered a news black-  
out at the jail, issued no statement.

It was learned, however, that no  
one had claimed the bodies and that  
burial was made early today in the  
jail yard.

There were few witnesses at the  
hanging. One said: "They all went  
in like men." But he refused further  
details of the actual hanging.

Members of the jury were not per-  
mitted to see it. They were kept in  
the nearby court house until called to  
view the bodies.

The graves were prepared in the jail  
enclosure some days ago, but today the  
earth was a frozen mass, and a fresh  
supply, unfrozen, had to be hauled  
from a contractor's lot to fill them in.

### HUN "OBSTACLE RACE"

LONDON, March 1. (CP)—Appar-
