## TRIO HANGED

against the hangings being carried  
out on a specially-erected cubicle on  
a lawn outside the jail.

A fourth man in the case, 19-year-old  
Eino Tillonen, had also been sentenced  
to death, but had his sentence com-  
muted to life imprisonment.

Mrs. Jamieson died in hospital July  
2, 1944, from burns covering 38 per  
cent of her body. Before she died she  
told of being tortured by four men who  
held burning newspapers to her limbs  
and finally held her on a hot stove  
in an effort to make her reveal the  
hiding place of her money in her  
Flanders, Ont., home, 65 miles east of  
here.

At their trial last September, the  
men admitted they had gone to the  
woman's home in search of a large  
sum of money—some \$40,000—which  
they believed hidden there. They ap-  
plied torture when they failed to find it.

As the hour of execution drew near,  
a few people gathered on the street  
across from the jail.

Among them was Mrs. Bernice Cas-  
nig, daughter of Mrs. Jamieson. She  
sat with an unidentified woman on the  
steps of a private residence facing the  
jail.

Police patrolled the jail entrance,  
and when a news photographer snap-  
ped a flashlight bulb, taking a picture  
of Mrs. Casnig, the officers cleared the  
street. All persons were ordered away,  
police escorting them for two blocks.

Newspapermen were not allowed to  
witness the hanging. They were forced  
to move from in front of the jail.

Shortly before 1 a.m. a black flag—  
the symbol of death—was run up,  
showing that the sentence of the court  
had been carried out.
