

IMMIGRANT, 33, CHARGED WITH MURDER OF FRIEND

TWO HELD IN PORT ARTHUR MURDER CASE

Widow Held As Material Witness

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Aug. 19 (AP)—Margaret Karst, widow of a man charged with the murder of his friend, was held today as a material witness in the case.

The woman, 36 years old, was held at the Port Arthur police station today. She is being held as a material witness in the case of her husband, George Gregor Hladky, 33, who is charged with the murder of his friend, Josef Parok, 35, on August 18.

At the request of Crown Attorney P. J. Robertson, who said Hladky had not yet time to arrange for defense counsel, Magistrate Russell granted Hladky a \$100 bail for a preliminary hearing on August 26.
