**MRS. LEITHENEN IS  
 ARRESTED; CHARGED  
 WITH CONSPIRACY**

leaned over the dock and buried his  
 face in his hands, as if in prayer.  
 The clerk of the court called for the  
 case of the King against Amelia Palma  
 and Mr. N. T. Davidson, for the pro-  
 secution, moved that the prisoner be  
 sentenced for the crime of which he  
 had been found guilty.

Justice Sutherland said: "Amelia  
 Palma, you have been tried, you have  
 had a fair trial, you had no counsel—  
 but Mr. Turville consented to act. He  
 is an experienced lawyer and he de-  
 voted his experience to you. He did  
 everything under the circumstances  
 with what opportunities he had, and  
 he defended you well. He endeavored  
 in the evidence to bring out everything  
 in your behalf. The jury have con-  
 victed you of the crime of murder.  
 You will see for yourself how difficult  
 it would be for a jury to come to a  
 different conclusion. This crime is no-  
 only a serious one, but has been at-  
 tended by terrible circumstances. On  
 your own admission you had immoral  
 relations with the murdered man's  
 wife, and lent yourself, if what you  
 say is true, to form a scheme on your  
 own part, which also may be true, to  
 put the husband out of the way. You  
 have been found guilty of having done  
 that. You yourself stated you were  
 willing to bribe a man to commit this  
 crime."

"It is now my duty to sentence you  
 for doing so, and I wish to know if  
 you have anything to say for yourself,  
 also your lawyer who has so ably de-  
 fended you."

The prisoner, with a sneer, replied  
 that it was not his fault.

The judge again asked if the pris-  
 oner had any reason why he should  
 not pronounce sentence. The prisoner  
 spoke to the interpreter for a consid-  
 erable time and then in an irritated  
 manner replied with an emphatic  
 "No."

Mr. Turville submitted that in view  
 of the prisoner's last statement as to  
 what took place, and as there was a  
 probability that it would implicate  
 others, he urged that clemency be  
 exercised.

Justice Sutherland continued: "The  
 sentence I am about to pronounce is  
 a serious one, and the only one I can  
 pronounce, I do not think there is any  
 hope that it can be commuted, and I  
 would suggest to you that within the  
 intervening time you make peace with  
 your Almighty God. The sentence of  
 the court for this crime is that you be  
 taken hence to the place from whence  
 you came, and that you shall be kept  
 in close confinement until Wednesday,  
 the birthday of June, 1915, and  
 that on that Wednesday you be taken  
 therefrom, thence to the place of exe-  
 cution, and there be hanged by the  
 neck until you are dead, and may God  
 have mercy on your soul."

As he was leaving the stand the  
 prisoner cursed the judge.

**Was Woman Kidnapped?**

The story of Mrs. Leithenen's being

Provincial Constable W. Symons,  
 due to whose energetic inquiries the  
 murderer was brought to book, is of  
 the opinion that no woman could have  
 been decoyed in broad daylight at the

 she was. The bush at the present time  
 is free of leaves and can easily be seen  
 through, otherwise there was a strag-  
 gling chance that her story might be  
 believed. Again, the street car travel-

 seems ridiculous to Constable Symons  
 that she could have been dragged off

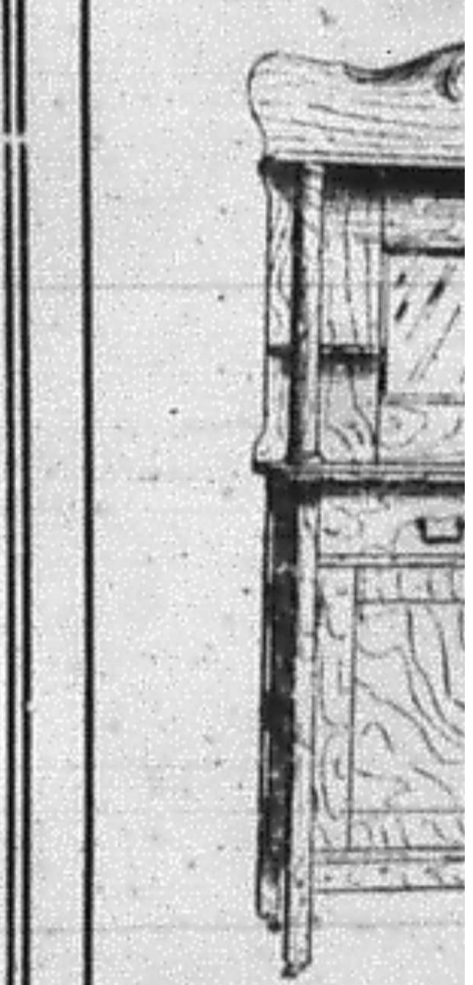
