## 592 Fatalities On US Roads

CHICAGO (AP) — The traffic death toll on U.S. highways rose to 592 as the four-day Christmas holiday weekend ended officially at midnight Sunday night.

The figure was within the range predicted by the National Safety Council, which had estimated 520 to 620 traffic deaths within the 78-hour period, which began at 6 p.m. Thursday.

California led the United States in number of traffic deaths with 55.

where she heard her son's name read with his five cohorts.

"I was up all night, calling back and forth to Winnipeg," she said. Mrs. Reid was in touch with her daughter-in-law and two granddaughters there, as well as with Air Canada officials to see if there were any further reports of the progress of the Toronto-Havana flight. "Once we heard the plane had landed in Cuba, we knew the worst was over," she said.

The DC-9 jetliner had completed a flight begun here at 6:40 p.m. Sunday and ending in Toronto, via Havana, at 5:45 a.m. today.

Mrs. Reid has not been able to contact her son since the plane arrived safely back on Canadian ground. She assumes Air Canada and RCMP officials are still involved in questioning them.

Mayme Yagnach had been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Yagnach, Harkness St. and had taken that flight back to Toronto where she works as a fashion buyer.

Miss Yagnach didn't know anything about her fellow-traveller until she arrived at her Toronto home and a friend telephoned her. "I've been nervous ever since," she reported.

City police chief Onni Harty said this morning that his force is working with Air Canada police and RCMP officers both here and in Toronto. "We believe we've narrowed the passenger list down to one suspect," Chief Harty said. The detective branch is following leads of the man's apparent recent stay "in the north ward." There was no further comment.

Air Canada Captain D. E. Glendenning described the traveller as a small-built man who appeared to be of Latin origin, but who spoke good English.
