said Monday night he would consult with external affairs on the possibility of extraditing the suspect on kidnapping or some other charge.

CRITTON ON PASSPORT

Police in Mississauga, who have jurisdiction in cases involving the airport, said they were told by the external affairs department the hijacker carried a passport bearing the name of Patrick Critton, 24, a native of New York City's Harlem district.

The man was described by the crew as well-dressed with close-cropped hair but the passport photo showed a man with long sideburns and an Afro-style haircut.

The jetliner and its crew of six arrived here safely from Cuba early Monday, a little more than 10 hours after the drama began on Flight 932 carrying 83 passengers on an 850-mile flight here from Thunder Bay, Ont.

Shortly before the plane was due to land, the hijacker brandished a gun and a grenade in the galley and produced a note demanding he be flown to Cuba.

The other 82 passengers left the medium-range aircraft when it landed, unaware that the plane had been commandeered. It taxied normally to a terminal ramp where the baggage was also unloaded before refuelling for the 1,450-mile flight to Havana.

Before he left the aircraft and was led away by Cuban officials, the hijacker left the crew members with a forwarding address.

"He said we could write to Hijacker House in Havana and he would get the letter," stewardess Ruth-Anne Snell, 21, of Woodstock, Ont., said after the plane's return.

He did not elaborate on Hijacker House.

APPEARED CALM

Helga Weterings, 28, another stewardess, described the hijacker as "very, very rational and rather calm."

The man also told a stewardess he was going to Cuba because he participated in a New York City bank robbery in which a teller had been shot.

However, a police spokesman in New York City said there was no warrant outstanding for anyone by the name of Patrick Critton.

He said the suspect's statement was being investigated by both the New York City police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The hijacker made his move about 7:35 p.m. Sunday, when he handed a note to stewardess Jean Keldson, 21, of Toronto. The note read:

"Think. We have fragmenta-

tion grenades and a .38 calibre revolver. Take me to the captain, we are going to Havana. This is no joke."

Although the note referred to "we" only one person was involved.

It was passed in the galley of the aircraft, ahead of the first-class section, and stewardesses said passengers were unaware what was happening.

Captain Donald Glendenning of Winnipeg, an Air Canada pilot for 18 of his 42 years, said the hijacker made no verbal threat when he entered the cockpit "but with a gun looking at you that's threat enough."

The aircraft left Toronto at 8:45 p.m. EST Sunday for the three-hour-and-18-minute flight to Havana. It landed at 11:52 p.m. and left two hours and 40 minutes later when the hijacker was led away by Cuban authorities.

Seized Yacht

VANCOUVER (CP) — A British Columbia woman is in jail in Mexico after the 41-foot yacht she was using was seized on behalf of a Vancouver bank branch.

Two of her children, who were on the boat with her, said in a telegram to Vancouver Sun columnist Jack Wasserman that they are not being allowed to see their mother.

Prison officials, in La Paz, Baja California, said Zoe Lloyd and Rex Lowes were arrested after a Bank of Nova Scotia branch in Vancouver requested seizure of the yacht Salfish for alleged non-payment of a loan.

No Summer Jobs at INCO For Students

SUDBURY (CP) — International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd. does not expect to be hiring students summer help for its operation here next year because of company plans for a three-week summer shutdown in August.

"Nothing definite has been decided yet," said Inco spokesman Brian Hemmingway. "But we don't anticipate hiring students during the summer."

The shutdown is planned to give company employees their vacations during the summer and will affect most of the company's 21,000 regular employees.

Warning Issued To Nixon

HONG KONG (AP) — The official North Vietnamese army newspaper warned today that President Nixon "will never get back" captured American prisoners of war unless he takes steps to end "the United States war of aggression against Vietnam."

Radio Hanoi broadcast the statement by the army newspaper Quan Doi Nhan Dan, the latest in a series of similar threats voiced by North Vietnamese organs since U.S. stepped up air attacks against North Vietnam.

The newspaper also accused the United States of lying when it said the latest plane attacks were directed against only military installations and munitions and supply facilities.

On Dec. 26 and 27, it said, wave after wave of U.S. planes hit civilian-populated villages and towns with steel pellet (anti-personnel) bombs designed to kill people."

Radio Hanoi also accused Defence Secretary Melvin Laird of using "false and shameless excuses" when he told a news conference Monday the United States had resumed intensive bombings of North Vietnam to protect American troops in South Vietnam.

Hanoi said Laird's statement was another attempt by the Nixon administration to justify extension and intensification of the Vietnam war "under the guise of protecting American troops."

Schmura Not Listed

MONTREAL (CP) — If there is a man named Chester Schmura in Matagami, Que., 350 miles northwest of here, he may be getting a telephone shortly.

One of the Canadian winners in today's Irish Sweeps Hurdle at Leopardstown, Ireland, was listed as Chester Schmura of Matagami.

The name was on one of the three Canadian-held tickets worth about \$50,000 each after Lockyersleigh's second-place finish in the event.

But newspaper reporters trying to reach Mr. Schmura were told there was no telephone number listed for him in Matagami.

ACCUSED OF STRAFING

The North Vietnamese foreign ministry accused the U.S. pilots of bombing and strafing attacks Monday against "many civilian populated areas, including a children's school," in Quang Binh province, just to the north of the demilitarized zone. The U.S. command refused to comment.

U.S. Defence Secretary Melvin Laird told a news conference in Washington Monday that the air attack on North Vietnam was prompted by Hanoi's violations of the understanding which resulted in the 1968 bombing halt.

Today, the U.S. and South Vietnamese governments cancelled the session Thursday of the Paris peace talks, giving as their reasons the same charges Laird had made.

In southeastern Laos, heavy North Vietnamese assaults on the Bolovens plateau, along the western rim of the Ho Chi Minh trail network, forced Thai and Laotian troops to abandon three positions, including the town of Pak Song.

The three Thai and Laotian battalions that withdrew several miles to the west are now the only government troops remaining on the strategic plateau.

India to Use Prisoners As "Bargaining Chips"

DACCA, East Pakistan (AP) — India will use Pakistani civilians held in Bangla Desh as pawns to deal for the safety of Sheik Mujibur Rahman and other Bengalis in West Pakistan, a high Indian official said today.

Shortly before this announcement, the first 600 of the 35,000 Pakistani prisoners of war held in Dacca began moving out by train and river steamer to prisoner-of-war camps in India.

India's special envoy to Bangla Desh, D. P. Bhar, said the plan to seek a swap is still being worked out and has not yet been offered to the Pakistani government of President Zulfikar Ali Bhutto.

New Delhi gave the Bangla Desh government the green light Monday to hold war crimes trials for Pakistani soldiers and provincial officials charged with slaughtering Bengalis since March. Foreign Secretary T. N. Kaul told Indian reporters at a special briefing in the Indian capital that the Geneva Convention on prisoners of war would not stand in the way.

Pilots To Discuss Security

MONTREAL (CP) — H. Simpson, president of Canadian Airline Pilots Association, says he is fed up with aircraft hijackings and is "highly confidential" today with airline persons apparently to discuss security.

"This is a difficult to discuss," said Mr. Simpson. "We don't want the public to know what we are doing for security."

"We have two or three proposals to put into effect. We must have co-operation from other airline associations."

An Air Canada DC-8 was hijacked in Toronto by a man carrying a handgun and gun who flew the jet to fly Cuba. The aircraft returned to Toronto.

The hijacking was the takeover of a commerce within Canadian skies within two months.

On Nov. 12, an Air Canada DC-8 jetliner was hijacked en route to Vancouver. After hours of mid-flight drama, the hijacker was subdued by the crew.
