Mr. Graustein said that communications had been sent to all newsprint customers of his company asking for a thirty-day period in which to prepare contracts for next year and stated that in the meantime the problem would be studied with a view to meeting "the prevailing Canadian sentiment in the matter of newsprint prices."

COLD-WAVE MOVES TOWARD EAST AND SLOWS UP BOATS

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 29.—Real winter greeted people of Ontario today. In the Sault Ste Marie district the mercury touched 12 below while in other parts of the province below zero temperatures were recorded. A north-west wind, which at times reached a velocity of 25 miles an hour, accompanied by frequent snowflurries added to the discomforts of pedestrians.

Shipping on the great lakes was moving slowly because of the heavy weather. Ships from Sault Ste Marie moved cautiously out on Lake Superior on their last voyage of the present season, handicapped by the cold weather and heavy seas. Storm warnings were displayed at the locks.

told a local hotel clerk that he expected to receive a substantial amount of cash from the woman which would enable him to go east and possibly return to Detroit.

On the very eve of his murder, he told this hotel clerk that he expected to get clothes and cash from her.

It is believed now that the young taxi-driver's association with the woman was of a business nature.

If Francoeur and Miss Malbeauf were friends, this fact was not known to Berglund, it is believed. He never was seen in Francoeur's company nor known to have mentioned his name to any of his own friends. This is one of the peculiar and puzzling elements in the case.

If Berglund expected to receive money from the woman Monday night, he was unsuccessful. He was without cash on Tuesday, the day that the woman checked out of the hotel. It is reported that this woman possessed \$1,700 in the bank, and that Berglund expected some of it. He did not get it.

The Murillo Trip

On Tuesday night he left Fort William with an unknown fare, ostensibly on a taxi trip to Murillo. Before he had gone six miles on the journey he was shot brutally from behind, a bullet crashing into his head and causing almost instant death.

No one saw the cab leave the city.

No one saw Berglund with an occupant in the back seat. The youth told his father he was taking a person to Murillo. He did not say whether it was a man or a woman.

Was Robert telling the truth when he informed his father he was going to Murillo? Was there some devious reason behind the trip? Had he arranged a clandestine meeting with a woman, and thought up the pretext of a trip to answer for his absence from the city?

Young Berglund was slain because some one "wanted him out of the way." This is the most plausible theory authorities have developed after probing deep into the mystery.

Maybe Grudge Slaying

It was either a "grudge slaying" or a premeditated plot to get rid of him. Other theories advanced involving robbery and run-running, largely are discredited now.
