#### Ev. D. McIvor Speaks

In the matter of security he felt that the government is to provide a basic standard of living at a lower price. Also the need for increased old age pensions has been his stand in the House. His proposal was for \$50 a month with a test for all those aged 65.

Although the unemployment insurance has been established as a splendid program, it is not fitting that it should take the place of a steady job and

McIvor emphatically stated, regarding the Trans-Canada highway project, that 50 per cent of the financing for the project has already been made available to the provinces by the federal government, whenever they are willing to take advantage of it. ## Romanian Bishops Become Victims

WASHTON CITY, June 23 (AP) — A source said today that two bishops of the outlawed Uniate church in Romania have been put to death by communist officials in an effort to break their allegiance to the

Uniate church is a Romanian church of the Roman Catholic faith. It was outlawed by the Romanian government last December.

The source said the communist government in Romania is bent upon "wiping out the two branches of the Roman Catholic faith there, from the ground with the use of every means of oppression and pressure."

A Vatican informant said the communist leaders demanded the Uniate bishops return to the Orthodox church in faith. Six bishops refused. They were led by Monsignor Ion Suci, representative of the Metropolitan of Fagaras and Albia Julia, the source said.

## Police Checking On Gun Used in Triple Shooting

An inquest into the triple shooting Tuesday of Judge Bruce J. McKittrick, William Gray and his wife Irene, will definitely be held, said Dr. Charles Powell today.

Although no definite date has been set for the inquiry, it will be held "in the near future," he said.

Meanwhile, police were still checking on the European-make revolver used by Gray. Rumors about the man were running rampant today, and police hope the inquest will put an end to all speculation.

Offices of City Clerk Arthur Evans and Mayor F. O. Robinson have been swamped today and yesterday with questions, suggestions and offers concerning the future welfare of Mrs. McKittrick and her three children.

Working without a judge, the juvenile and family court is awaiting a replacement from the provincial government.

Meanwhile the body of William Gray rests at Everest's chapel awaiting funeral plans.

Judge McKittrick was buried in Riverside cemetery this afternoon after services in St. Paul's United Church at 3 o'clock.

Mayor Robinson and City Council attended in a body. Three ministers officiated: Rev. R. A. Peden, of Trinity United, Rev. W. C. Mercer, St. Paul's, and Rev. S. R. McLeod, of St. Paul's United Church, Winnipeg.

All members of the session at St. Paul's also attended.

The body was removed to the church from Sargent's chapel at 11 a.m. today and lay in state until services. Hundreds of friends and some who never had seen the kindly judge, filed past the casket.

## 275 Chamber Men to Get Out the Vote

"Once again the Chamber of Commerce is devoting its efforts to get the voters out on Monday," R. J. Flatt, president of the Fort William Chamber, announced today.

"The Chamber is co-operating with the Junior Chamber so that voters will be vividly reminded that it is one of our privileges to express our preferences on this day." The Senior Chamber is concentrating on calling upon households while the Jaycees are organizing a transportation program.

Mr. Flatt said that 275 men will take time off on Monday to call on the voters in the particular block to which they have been assigned. Through a similar effort last December a total of about 70 per cent of the electors responded and the Chamber is out to try to equal that record.

"In performing this work, the Chamber is carrying out its policy of stimulating an interest in the privileges of citizenship," Mr. Flatt said.
