lying face down with the head in the snow and frozen ground. After making a complete survey of the scene and after taking several official snapshots, the police wrapped the body in a tarpaulin and hauled it by toboggan to a waiting four-wheel drive former army truck on which it was brought to the town of Schreiber.

Joseph D. Grant was well known in the city of Calgary in the early days, according to reports from that center. His widow and one daughter, Mrs. K. R. Sullivan, reside in Calgary.

His widow, 71, is at present in California visiting with her sister. She has not been informed of the tragic events for fear of a second stroke she might suffer. Mrs. Sullivan, the daughter, of 1210 Westmount Boulevard, a war widow, left by plane from Calgary for Port Arthur on Tuesday.

#### Two Rifles Sought

The second chapter in the case, which broke about the middle of Dec., 1946, when relatives of Grant became anxious as to his whereabouts, will start with the appearance of Charles Martin in Port Arthur police court on Friday morning.

Martin was brought to Port Arthur from Regina to answer a charge of forgery committed at Schreiber, where he had resided for about a year and a half, and also for questioning in connection with the disappearance of Grant and Duchesneau. It is believed that the double murder was committed during the first week in December at which time very little snow covered the old mining property. Since that time huge drifts of snow held the secret to the disappearance of the two men until shovels piled by provincial police, under the direction of Inspector Kelly, turned up the bodies of the two men.

It is not known whether the two rifles, known to have been in the possession of Grant and Duchesneau, have been recovered as yet.

According to Inspector Kelly further investigation will be made at the mining property just as soon as the snow leaves the ground in the spring.
