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## Martin Remanded On Murder Charges At Crown Request

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In a five-minute appearance before  
Magistrate Walter Russell in Magis-  
trate's Court today, when two charges  
of murder were read to him, Charles  
Martin, 35, was remanded in custody  
on both charges to Saturday, April 5,  
at the request of Crown Attorney P. V.  
Ibbetson.

On remand on the first charge of  
murder, that of Joseph Grant, 71-year-  
old prospector, Martin heard himself  
charged with the murder of Marcel  
Duchesneau, 28, whose frozen bullet-  
riddled body was found one day later  
than Grant's under four feet of snow  
at their mining property near Schrei-  
ber last March 19.

Magistrate Russell re-read the first  
charge of murder which was laid  
Against Martin by Constable Harry  
Drackley of the Schreiber detachment,  
Provincial Police, and then read the  
second charge which was laid by Con-  
stable Ivar Lellava, Port Arthur.

In asking for the remand, Crown  
Attorney Ibbetson told the court that  
a complete investigation had not been  
completed at the scene of the double  
murder. "The court undoubtedly knows  
that heavy snows in the vicinity of the  
mining property has hampered the in-  
vestigation," he said. Mr. Ibbetson was  
presumably referring to the search for  
the murder weapon, believed to have  
been a high-powered rifle, and two  
rifles known to have been in possession  
of the two prospectors. The search for
