Payroll Fraud In Highways Probe Charged

TORONTO (CP) — The Toronto Telegram says today in a newspaper story that a man and his truck, although not working, were kept on the payroll of the Ontario highways department for nearly seven years at more than \$400 a month.

In a Fort William dispatch by John Dalrymple, Telegram staffer, the paper says the truck driver will be a key witness in the trial of five highways department officials on fraud charges.

"His testimony is expected to show alleged 'irregularities' in the department here (Fort William) extending back at least seven years. The charges at present laid against the officials date back only to 1949," the story said.

The prosecution will try to show that one of the senior officials in the department collected some \$30,000 of this man's pay after his separation from the department by forging his name to pay cheques, the dispatch added.

The Toronto Star in a Fort William dispatch by Gwyn Thomas, Star staff reporter, says today that at least one bridge, called for in plans of highways being built in the Lakehead area, can't be found by investigators.
