OTTAWA (CP) - Resources Minister Lesage got a "hearty laugh" next Monday. That's what the resources department said Friday in a press release which later was withdrawn.

McIntyre Mine Strike Ended

TIMMINS (CP)-The strike by the United Steelworkers of America (CIO-CCL) against McIntyre Porcupine Mines Limited is over.

About 1,000 of the 1,400 men who struck Sept. 23 to enforce demands for a "substantial" wage increase and the check-off of union dues voted Friday night to accept a settlement plan worked out in Toronto earlier this week.

The union said an "overwhelming" majority approved the settlement which calls for a general increase of five cents in the basic hourly rate of 93 cents but no check-off.

A strike by the same union against the Hollinger gold mine was settled last month. The union still is on strike against six other mines in this Northern Ontario dis-
