Claim Contempt Highways Probe

Net Gain Is \$905 For CLE

Despite a loss of \$9,567.53 on the Water Follies presentation, the Canadian Lakehead Exhibition showed a net profit of \$905.65 for the year ending Nov. 30, 1953, according to an auditor's report presented by Wilf Walker, exhibition secretary-manager, at Friday's annual meeting.

Admissions and grandstand attendance at the exhibition accounted for the largest single revenue These revenues totalled \$79,850.60.

The midway carnival rendered revenue totalling \$13,700.63 and rent of grounds and concessions adding \$6.703.50.

Other exhibition revenue included: federal and provincial government grants, \$950 and \$1,140 respectively; space rental, inside icans a Briton and 325 commercial exhibits, \$1,647.50; auditorium earnings, \$7.685.35; coliseum rentals, \$1,095.75, miscellautral zones were caught neous, \$49.04 and membership fees

Eastern Papers Rapped

Defence counsel for three of five men charged with fraud and conspiracy at the Fort William office of the Ontario department of highways told a Magistrate's Court hearing at Fort William this morning that an Eastern Ontario newspaper was "in flagrant contempt of court" in publishing some material on the highways case.

T. P. Callon of Port Arthur, acting for A. M. Mills, Thomas Ayres and Watson Turner, was supported by Magistrate C. D. LeMay, who told three Toronto reporters present that "the press has been cautioned now, and it will be for the reporters to bear that in mind in their future reports."

THE HIGHLIGHT

The defence objection was the highlight of an otherwise routine remand of Mills, Ayres, Turner, Donald Gandier of Fort William and Douglas Cutting of Fort William on the charges.

At the request of the defence, the five men were remanded until Feb. 6, when they will elect trial by a magistrate or higher court.

W. A. Maloney of Fort William, counsel for Gandier, also told the court that his client would not be prepared to proceed with a preliminary hearing Feb. 6, and Crown Attorney P. V. Ibbetson, QC, said, he would confer on this point with C. L. Dubin, QC, Toronto, who was appointed special prosecutor.

A packed courtroom of about 60 people, including a dozen-odd press and radio representatives, a dozen police officers, and several lawyers, watched the hearing. Albert Wren, MLA of Kenora, was in the police station for the hearing, but could not find a seat and was asked to leave a few minutes before the highways case came up.

Several other minor charges, including drunkenness, theft and dangerous driving, were disposed of before the highways suspects
