THE ELECTIONS,

The Ontario elections are once more a thing of the past. Mr. Mowat is returned to power, and everything is lovely. North and South Grey have gone Reform, and Centre Grey had a narrow shave, but under the circumstances it would not have been a very great surprise had Centre Grey departed from the fold along with the other two. To begin with the Reformers brought out a gentleman of extraordinary strength. They could not have found a stronger. Dr. Hunt had the "hunt" for votes to himself, comparatively speaking. His tactics were singularly moderate, yet effective, when the other candidate was not in the field to speak for himself. Major Rorke's accident very nearly cost him his seat. Added to this, too, was the very meagre interest taken by the electorate. The vote was an exceedingly small one, not quite one half being polled. Below we give the personnel of the new parliament with the majorities of each member. The Empire says Mr. Mowat will only have a majority of sixteen, with the speaker in the chair against 26 in the last parliament.

The Canadian Horticulturist for June contains a photograph of Mr. Charles Gibb, late president of the Montreal Horticultural Society, whose untimely demise occurred at Aden in March last while taking a trip around the world in the interests of horticulture. An interesting sketch of Mr. Gibb's life and work accompanies the picture. This sketch pays a high tribute of praise to Mr. Gibb for his unselfish devotion of fortune and time to the advancement of horticulture in Canada. Mr. John Craig, Horticulturist of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, who was a personal friend of Mr. Gibb, writes as follows: "It may not be generally known that Mr. Gibb's last efforts were directly in the interests of and for the advancement of Canadian Horticulture. The journey which may be looked upon as the indirect cause of his death, was one that he had in contemplation for months previous to the time of starting, which was in July 1889. After spending some time in British Columbia, he took steamer to Japan, where he studied the flora very thoroughly, especially of the northern part, then proceeded to the mountainous regions of China. Next we find him in India, Ceylon, and lastly Cairo. After reaching this point he and his friends looked forward to a speedy reunion. From various points along the line of travel he forwarded packets of seeds, and scions of many forest and fruit trees which specially commended themselves to his notice. There is now at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, a valuable and interesting collection of plants being propagated from this stock. Among these are fruits which may prove valuable additions to our lists for southern Ontario."
