On the evening of the 9th inst., the Clarksburg brass band formed up in front of the Major's residence and delivered in their usual brilliant style, a salutation consisting of the following selections:—"See! the conquering hero comes," Quickstep—"Shell Rock," "Let Erin remember the days of old," "Home Again." This brought our worthy member to the front, who tendered them his sincere thanks for this expression of their good will and esteem. He appreciated this demonstration for many reasons:

1st. Because he felt that it was rendered free from partisan feelings and would doubtless have been as freely accorded to his opponent had he been successful. 2nd. Because it was a village band that through 18 years of trials and difficulties had rendered good service and still maintains its reputation and strength.

#### General News.

A census enumerator in Richmond, Va., has found a colored woman named Martha Gray who has had 37 children since 1868.

A terrible storm in the neighborhood of Binghamton, N. Y., on Thursday night did damage amounting to over \$60,000. Considerable live stock perished.

It is stated that Henry M. Stanley is to deliver fifty lectures in the United States during next fall and winter, and that he is to receive \$5,000 for lecturing in New York and £2,000 for those in other cities.

The execution of Henry Smith, the London wife murderer, on Saturday, appears to have been accomplished without any of the unfortunate hitches that too often add horror to such events.

Henry M. Stanley is said to have accepted the governor-generalship of the Congo Free State.

The Alaska exploring party are said to have discovered a large lake in British territory in the far north.

John Dillon, William O'Brine and John Redmond have been appointed delegates to make a tour of America in the autumn in the interests of the Irish national movement.

An explosion and fire in the Hill Farm mine at Dunbar, Pa., Monday, resulted, it is believed, in the loss of 34 lives. Eighteen miners only escaped out of 52 known to be in the mine.
