**THE CHAMPION MEAN MAN.**—It is said that a farmer living on concession 10, Wallace, not far from Palmerston, watched a number of children go into his swamp on his farm on Monday last to pick berries. When the youngsters had filled their pails, a son of the farmer appeared with large pails and took every berry from them. The children say they had permission to go into the patch. As an assault is alleged to have been committed upon one of the children, it is probable the matter will be sifted before a magistrate. Rumor says the farmer is a Christian.

The vicinity of Rosemount, extending from the 6th line on the west to Sisterville on the east, was visited by a terrible hail storm on Friday afternoon of last week. A great deal of damage was done to the crops, field after field being almost totally destroyed. The hail stones were as large as hens' eggs and of all kinds of shapes. All the windows on the west side of the houses in Rosemount were completely demolished. It was by all odds the worst storm that ever visited this part of the country. The property destroyed in the shape of crops, etc., will be very hard to estimate.—[Shelburne Free Press.

Prof. Saunders of the Ottawa Experimental Farm has made arrangements for a large exhibit at the coming Toronto Industrial Fair. The exhibit will consist of 100 varieties of potatoes, including 60 new varieties grown from seedlings originated on the Experimental Farm. A complete collection of cereals will also be shown including samples grown on the Northwest experimental farms. There will also be samples of the two-rowed barley grown from seed imported from England. Prof. Shaw of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, has also arranged to have on hand a collection of 300 samples of grain, many of them grown from imported seed. This collection includes barley, winter and also spring wheat, oats and peas. Samples of the grain as imported will also be shown in glass jars. There will also be an exhibit of various other kinds of farm produce from the experimental farm which will be of special interest to the farmer.
