MORTUARY GOLD.

The French scientist, Mr. Victor Mennier, as the result of careful inquiries, asserts that the American dentists insert in American teeth, each year, the enormous amount of 800 kilogrammes (about 1,800 pounds) of the precious metal, which represents nearly \$450,000. This gold is never recovered, of course, but is buried with the person in whose mouth it is placed. Making allowance for the rapid increase of the population of the United States and for the continued deterioration of American teeth, it appears that in less than one hundred years the American cemeteries will contain a larger amount of gold than now exists in France.

A MONSTER RECK OF GRANITE.

Vinalhaven, Maine, claims to have produced the largest stone ever brought to light. The Dodwell Granite Company recently quarried a shaft of granite which is the largest piece of stone ever quarried

anywhere, and, if erected, will be the highest, largest, and heaviest single piece of solid stone standing, or that ever stood, as far as any record can be found. In height it considerably exceeds any of the Egyptian obelisks. The tallest of these, which was brought from Heliopolis to Alexandria by Emperor Constantine, and afterward taken to Rome, where it is still standing, is 105 feet 7 inches high, while the Vinalhaven shaft is 115 feet long, 10 feet square at the base, and weighs 850 tons. It is understood, says Stone, that the company quarried this immense monolith of their own account, not having an order for anything of the kind, and they suggest that it would be a fitting contribution from Maine for the monument to be erected in honor of General Grant.

General News.

Mr. Stanley's health is still far from perfect.

The first of the season's oats marketed in Winnipeg Monday brought 50 cents a bushel.

The hay crop in Ireland is ruined, and the condition of cereals and the turf is bad.

At Maisau, Austria, lightning struck a railway train and threw twenty trucks down an embankment.

The Earl of Aberdeen, who is visiting Canada, has telegraphed his willingness to formally open the Toronto Industrial Exhibition.

The U. S. consul at Palermo has been called to account by the Italian premier for advising American tourists to keep away from Sicily owing to brigandage.

Reports from Manitoba would seem to show that the injury done by Thursday night's frost was not so serious as has been reported. A large proportion of the wheat has been cut, and much of the remainder is so far advanced as to be able to withstand a slight frost.

Holzhay, the train robber and murderer confined in the Marquette, Mich., prison, whose attempt to starve himself to death was frustrated by the injection of food, got hold of a scrap of iron on Monday and cut the artery in his wrist, besides trying to dash his brains out against the wall. He was almost dead when found, and was put in a straight jacket after his wounds had been dressed.
