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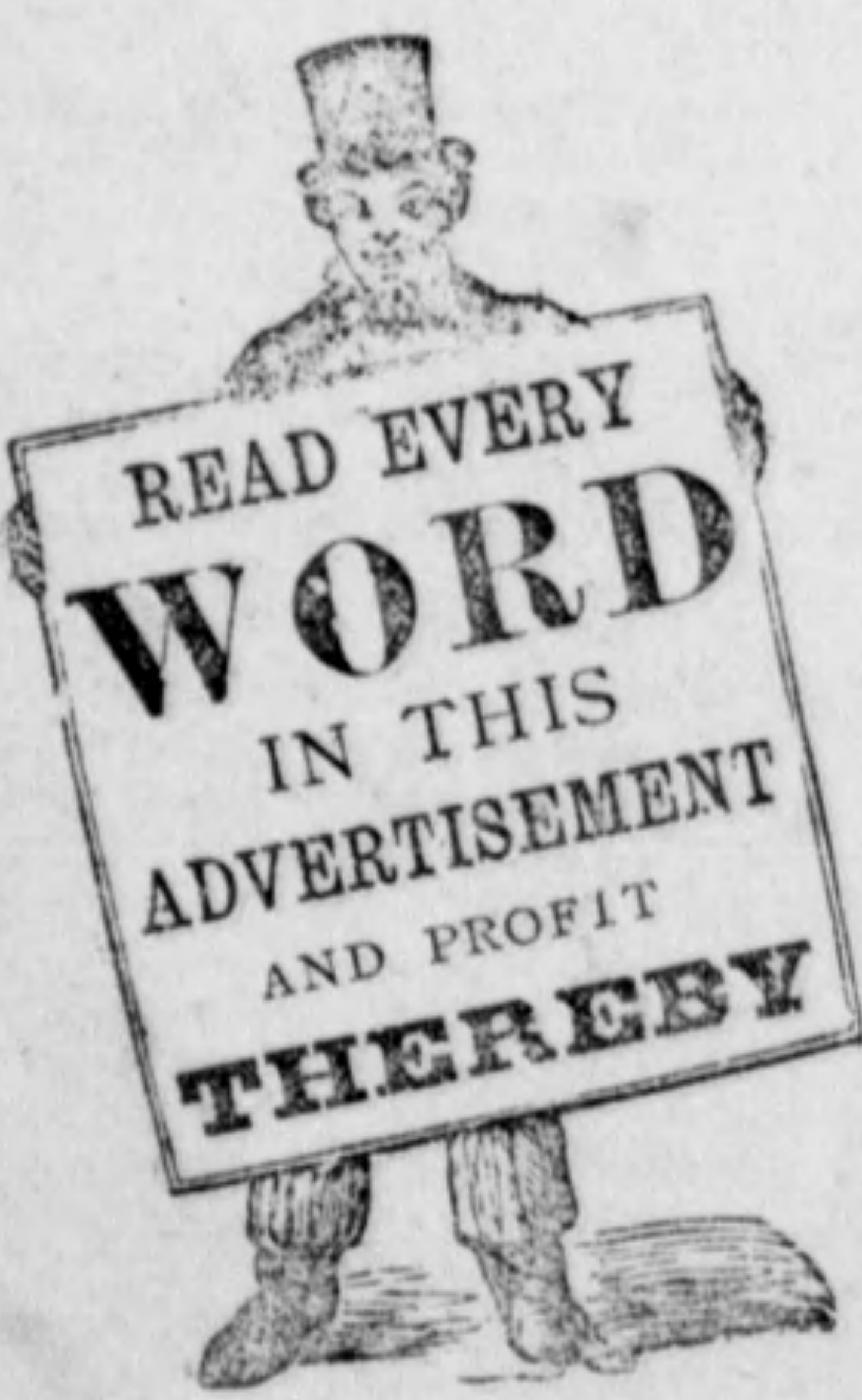

Owen Sound News.

SIR HECTOR ADDRESSED.

OWEN SOUND, Aug. 30.—When it was announced that Sir Hector Langevin, Minister of Public Works, would be a passenger on the Alberta leaving this port to-day, it was decided by the town council and the board of trade to unite in presenting him with an address as an expression of the appreciation the citizens of the town have of the interests he has taken in the improvement of Owen Sound harbor. The steamboat express, arriving at 3.25, brought in the distinguished gentleman and party. They were met by Mr. James Masson, M. P., Mayor McClean and President Parker, of the board of trade, and escorted to the platform erected on the dock. As Sir Hector stepped up on the platform three rousing cheers went up from the vast crowd which had assembled. Six young ladies were on the platform, and Miss Lulu Masson stepped forward and pinned a beautiful bouquet on the lapel of Sir Hector's coat, while the others presented the Misses Langevin and Mrs. Chavais, who were also on the platform, with magnificent bouquets and an address of welcome. In reply to the address Sir Hector Langevin said that as a passenger through the town he was surprised at receiving such an ovation, yet he need not be when he recollected the reception that had been tendered him in years past. The council and board of trade were very kind in attributing to his enterprise the improvements which had been made, but while he had done his share, the thanks were due to Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues for the manner in which they had received and acted on his recommendations, not only for the work here but in all parts of the Dominion. Making no distinction in favor of race or religion all were treated alike as citizens of Canada and subjects of the Queen. He was a French-Canadian and a Roman Catholic, but he was a loyal Canadian—as loyal as his English, Scotch or Irish compatriots. After briefly referring to the leadership of Sir John Macdonald, whose colleague he had been for thirty years, he spoke of the grandeur of our heritage and the bright future which was in store for the Dominion if Canadians were true to themselves, their country and their Queen. He was sorry he had not time to see the improvements which were in progress, but he knew from his engineer's reports and from his friend, Mr. James Masson, M. P., that Owen Sound had a harbor unrivalled on the lakes, and while the Government had done a great deal, the town had done its share. Of course credit was due to the C. P. R. for making this their Ontario port, which added greatly to its prosperity. He concluded his speech by proposing three cheers for the Queen.

OLD JOHN WAWBEDIC DROWNED.

Word has been received of a drowning accident which occurred on the bay about three miles from town on Thursday afternoon. Old John Wawbedic, a Cape Croker Indian, with his family, consisting of two women, a young man and a boy about 14 years of age, were returning in a sail boat to the reservation when a squall struck them, capsizing the craft, throwing the whole party into the water. The accident was noticed from shore by a party of campers, and Mr. W. S. Parkinson, of New Orleans, put off in a skiff and, though the accident occurred about a mile and a half from shore, succeeded in picking up all the unfortunates except Wawbedic, who sank shortly after the upset took place. The women were exhausted and could not have held up much longer. Fire-water is blamed for the disaster.

Reforms Wanted.

To the Editor of The Advance.
DEAR SIR—Please allow me to draw attention to some things I consider wrong in the administration of our municipal affairs. I think it time the ward system was abolished.

The ratepayers should undoubtedly have the privilege of electing their representatives to the County Council. When we find that three men can sit down at a council table and by voting for each other they can elect two of the three as representatives to the County Council I am fully convinced there should be a change. It is not an honorable way of getting the position. Yet that is the way our Deputy Reeves were elected last January. Also the manner of laying out money on the roads should be changed. Before the roads were made fit for public travel it was right to have them fitted up, but now that they are improved the money should be spent in improving leading roads and let the statute labor do the patching. I would suggest this: Find out the roads most travelled and in need of repair, and fit them up in good shape, and so on from year to year. But while the ward system is in existence this will not be done, as whether rightfully or wrongfully each ward claims a like amount, and by this means the money is so divided that its usefulness is gone. I think, Mr. Editor, these are sufficient reasons for doing away with the ward system. I would like to hear from other ratepayers on this important question. Let us hear from you through The Advance.
