OUR EXHIBITION.

The season of fall fairs has once more arrived. The East Grey fall exhibition will be held in Flesherton on Sept. 23 and 24, and gives great promise of being the most successful ever held in this riding. The attractions are away beyond anything heretofore offered, and should bring out an enormous crowd of people. Indeed, the fact of N. Clarke Wallace, M. P., Supreme Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge, having been secured to open the exhibition, will, we are certain, be of itself an attraction that will induce large numbers to be present to hear what he has to say. Another very important and interesting feature will be a museum of Indian relics and curiosities, which has been very kindly loaned by a gentleman who has made the gathering of these a life study. Many of these implements of warfare, totem pipes, and other strange mementos of a bygone race can only be seen in large national museums, and even in these they are rare. If curator Boyle, of the Canadian Institute, discovers the fact that these relics are to be on exhibition here he will no doubt be present to try and discover upon what terms the specimens can be secured for the Institute. As it is, the gentleman who owns this collection has dealt liberally with the Institute by donating a number of specimens thereto, and his name is to be found in the last-issued Institute report. In this collection there are over 200 curiosities, and we cannot too strongly urge people to come and inspect them. Many may never have another opportunity of seeing the strange remains of the red men who once roamed our forests. This portion of the exhibition will be free to all who attend the show. Other attractions are numerous (for which see bills), and as we said before, everything points to the most gratifying success this year. Other exhibitions will, we believe, be placed somewhat in the shade by East Grey fall show, and we would not be at all surprised to see its success this year pronounced as phenomenal.

The great "mastodon" exhibition at Toronto was officially opened on Tuesday by the Earl of Aberdeen. The success of this mammoth exhibition has been phenomenal, and this year it promises to outstrip any of its predecessors. Flesherton and vicinity will send more than its usual quota of visitors this year, therefore it must surely be a greater success than ever. If the Toronto people would only reciprocate by coming up to ours!

Artemesia Council.

Council met in the Town Hall on Monday, Sept 1, all the members present. A communication was received from the clerk of Markdale, asking permission of Artemesia Council to issue debentures for a sum of \$5,500 for the purpose of building a school house, said debentures to extend over a period of twenty years. A communication was received from J. W. Frost, requesting the Council to reimburse Mr. Runstadler for the loss of certain eggs. This the members did not see their way clear to do. A committee of villagers waited upon the Council

about certain matters in connection with the new deviation, and asked permission to expend some \$200 upon the station road which had been subscribed toward that work. The following bylaw dealing with their desires was passed in open Council:

By-law No. 465 of the municipal corporation of the Township of Artemesia, to appoint as commissioners certain persons of the village of Flesherton for improving the gravel road. Whereas the said corporation of Artemesia has undertaken a certain deviation at a cost of about four hundred dollars, whereas certain other improvements are deemed necessary and whereas several of the inhabitants of the said village have contributed towards said improvements, it is deemed advisable to appoint commissioners among themselves under certain restrictions. Be it therefore enacted by the Council of the Township of Artemesia, that R. J. Sproule, A. Munshaw and M. Richardson be and they are hereby appointed as such commissioners to collect and disburse such sums as cited in the preamble hereto, as they have or may have from time to time. That in doing such work of repair of any description, public travel shall not be interfered with more than absolutely necessary, and any part of the road repaired or attempted to be repaired shall be left in good travelable condition. That a full return and report of such receipts and expenditure shall be made to this Council on or before the fifteenth day of November 1890. That although the said commissioners are hereby appointed by this Council and full authority granted to them to alter, cut down, level or gravel the said road, such authority shall only extend and shall be limited to such sums as the said village or other persons may voluntarily contribute, and for which this corporation in no sense shall be responsible.

A communication from W.K. Flesher, re valley road, was, on motion of Messrs. McArthur and Sharp, referred through the reeve to T. B. Gilliland for correction and report at next meeting of Council.

Moved by Messrs. Boland and Sharp, that the sum of \$30 be paid to Mr. Rumsey for right of way for deviation around what is known as Collins' hill. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. McArthur and Boland, that the reeve issue his order for the payment of the following accounts: W. H. Thurston, advertising and printing bills, \$4.29; also for this day's session of Council. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. McArthur and Thompson, that the reeve be, and is hereby appointed by this council to reply to J. W. Frost's communication re Runstadler's claim. Carried. Council adjourned.

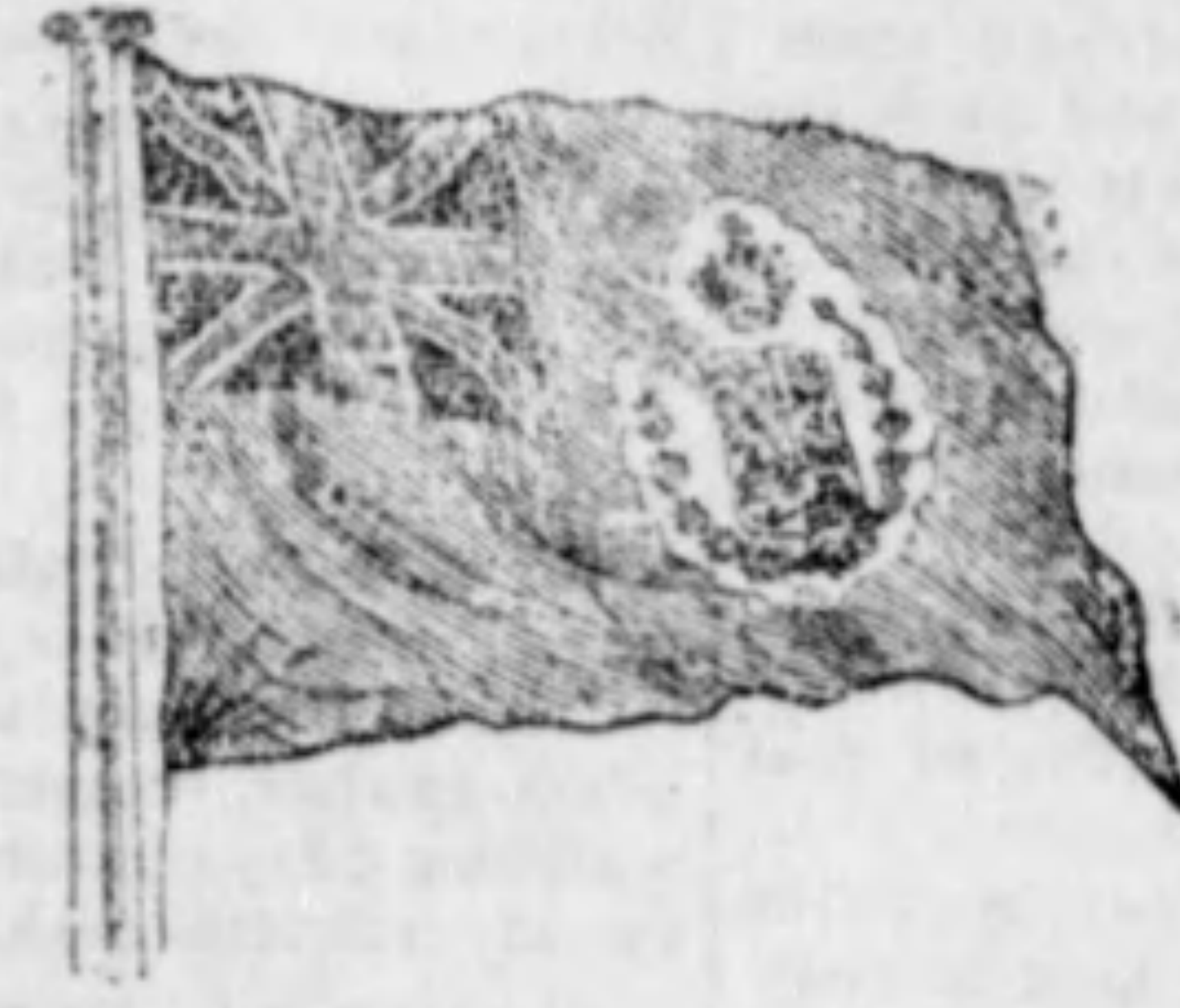
