### EAST GREY FAIR.

Two better days for the East Grey fall fair could scarcely have been desired. The air was somewhat cool, but the sun shone brightly and the elements were propitious. Our fair has come and gone, and it has been a great success. There has been an uphill struggle during the past few years, from the fact of our county being so cut up with other shows, but this has now been overcome and the East Grey Agricultural society is once more upon its feet. This year the prizes were slightly enlarged, and next year they will be made still larger. It is the quality of the prizes which tells in the making of a show, and the directors are fully cognizant of that fact. The show was a success last year, but it has been a much greater success this. The number of entries were far in excess of last year, and the quality and quantity of the inside exhibit was really the best we have ever seen at a county show, with the exception perhaps of ladies' work. The ladies did not come forward as they should with their fancy work, although the display was very fair. In grain, roots and fruit the display was something enormous. We challenge any county exhibition in Ontario to show a better display of fruits than was shown at our own sight here in Flesherton. The excellence of this was generally commented upon, and goes to show that although we are "high and dry" in the Township of Ardenesia we can more than hold our own with the rest of the province in apples and other fruits. We saw the exhibit of apples at Toronto, and pronounce ours to compare most favorably therewith. Now that farmers are finding a good market for their apples, no doubt even more attention will be paid to the raising of good shipping fruits. Owing to the time we go to press we are unable to do full justice to the exhibition and have only space to mention a few of the most prominent features. In cattle Mr. R. Oliver showed his magnificent herd of Devon cattle, among which was the mother of the fine bull "Ensign" which took first prize at the Toronto exhibition this year. Mr. Oliver sold this animal to J. Rudd, of Eden Mills, and is now probably sorry that he parted with him. Mr. Henry Frock showed two splendid Durham animals. Mr. Jos. Cairns showed a herd of handsome Ayrshires, and Mr. Geo. Stewart a 4-year-old Ayrshire bull. Mr. J. I. Graham showed an extremely pretty Durham heifer in the year old class, whose weight we did not note, but she is a beauty. Mr. Joel Wurtz and Mr. Wm. Caswell each showed two wonderfully large Berkshire boars. The sheep were mostly good and in considerable variety, but we did not learn who any of the exhibitors were. In sheep and stock the judging had not been done at time of writing. The complete prize list will be given next week.

Inside, the attraction which drew the largest amount of attention was the exhibit of Indian relics, so kindly loaned by Mr. R. Baskerville, of Manitowaning, who also came down and oversaw the placing of them on exhibition. The strange utensils of the red man of bygone ages were placed there before the wondering eyes—strange mementoes of an almost extinct race, and things of which the successors of the present day know scarcely the use. Then there was in connection with this the Ontario mineral exhibit, made by Mr. Martin, of Proton Station, and the Manitoba exhibit of cereals. It was slightly after 1 p.m. when N. Clarke Wallace, M. P., arrived on the ground, in company with the president, Mr. Stewart, and Dr. Sproule, M. P. The directors, accompanied by the Flesherton band, had met him at the station. After viewing the exhibits inside Mr. Wallace was introduced to the audience by the president, Mr. Geo. Stewart. Mr. Wallace on arising, said he was not inclined to make a lengthy speech, and then proceeded to make one of the neatest little speeches we have

ever heard compressed into so short a space of time. He had not known the county of Grey, only by having passed through it by rail, but what he saw today was a very agreeable surprise indeed. After paying exceedingly high compliments to what he had seen Mr. Wallace proceeded to questions of more moment. He spoke of his connection with the "Combines Bill," and said that though the senate had badly pruned the measure as it was passed in the House of Commons, still the members of the House are not discouraged and would make the Senate to understand that the people of this country rule the country. [Cheers.] Proceeding from this question the speaker said that considerable had been heard of a bill under discussion on the other side called the McKinley bill, and fears had been expressed that it would injure the Canadian farmer. He showed that this could not be, for the Americans could not possibly raise as good a quality of barley as we, and they were obliged to buy our barley for their use, therefore they would have to pay the duty themselves. This McKinley Bill was framed with the view of bringing Canada to its knees. A similar method had been adopted in 1866, and met with disastrous results to themselves. This attempt would be an equally humiliating affair. Canada was a country of magnificent resources. A few years ago we were a country of disunited provinces without any well-defined fiscal policy. To-day we were a united Dominion stretching from ocean to ocean. Great railways had been built, manufactures introduced, the northwest and British Columbia developed. Years ago, when we were a young country, if we could resist the demands of the United States that we should unite with them, how much more should we refuse to do so now. We are a northern nation, and history has proven that the northmen can subdue the south. Their vigor is greater than the southerners. The speaker then thanked the people for their kind attention, and after declaring the exhibition open resumed his seat. Three hearty cheers were given for the speaker, which he gracefully acknowledged and invited everybody to be present at the fall fair to be held at Woodbridge.
