ARTEMESIA FALL FAIR.

Once more the Artemesia fall fair has proven its claim to the proud distinction of being the best township fair in this county. Year by year it is growing in public favor and general excellence. Last year it was found almost impossible to get the quantity of stuff together and have it judged all in the one day, consequently it was made a two-day show this year. The result has demonstrated the wisdom of this step, for the general verdict was yesterday, "Better and better and more of it." Not only was the exhibition much superior to last year, but the attendance was also far in advance. Priceville people are proud of their show, and well they may be, for it is a grand institution for them and amply repays them for their fostering care of it. All concerned in this show appear to "go in to win," from the secretary and president down to every individual member, and the result is seen in the splendid exhibition of this year. For live stock of all kinds this show was fully up to last year—and that is awarding a high praise indeed. Of sheep we never saw a finer lot together. Mr. R. Oliver and son, and Mr. Wm. Meads were large exhibitors in this class. Horses were extra fine in each class. Two-year-old colts were something to be specially proud of. We did not learn the names of nearly all the exhibitors, and cannot give the list of prize winners this week, but noticed that Mr. A. Ostrander showed a beautiful 2-year-old percheron and also a clydesdale. Mr. Ronald Morrison, of Bunnessan, exhibited a very handsome 2-year-old filly which, we believe, took second prize. Cattle were fully represented in all classes, Mr. Oliver and Mr. Cairns being large exhibitors. The inside show of roots, grain, vegetables, and dairy produce was also ahead of any year's exhibit thus far. In the hall Mr. R. Oliver showed a very handsome case of minerals, the large majority of which came from his mine near Thessalon. Judging by these specimens Mr. Oliver has evidently struck it quite rich and we trust the ultimate result will prove that he has. Mining has been known to pay better than raising sheep, but sheep as a general rule are a surer crop. The weather was glorious, and Priceville business men did a rushing trade. Dancing was the order of the afternoon in Watson's hall. Our thanks are tendered to the directors for many courtesies. The prize list may be looked for next week.
