**Artemesia Council.**

Council met in the town hall on Monday and transacted a large amount of business. All the members were present, the reeve in the chair. The following communications were read: From the Co. treasurer, list of lands liable to be sold for taxes; from Co. treasurer re maturing of debentures; from the mayor of Orangeville asking for \$5 to defray expenses of railway deputation to Ottawa; from C. P. R. solicitors re taxation of property at the station; from A. Blue re financial statement and auditor's report; petition from D. McLeod, A. McMillan and T. W. McMullen asking to be removed from S.S. No. 6 and put into S.S. No. 10; from Peter Currie, Jas. Vause and others asking for opening of sideline No. 30, N.D.R., to base line, to give short access to the station; from Proton council asking for \$2.25 as Artemesia's share for building culvert on town line; from treasurer of Markdale asking payment for use of town hall for division court purposes; from registrar's office, Toronto, certificate of registration, showing that there were 71 births, 42 marriages and 25 deaths registered during 1890 in this township; an account from C. W. Rutledge for stationery, \$12.60; from Arch. Currie, re building of bridge on townline Artemesia and Proton; from the Flesherton R. T. of T., asking refund of money paid for use of town hall; from the township treasurer asking for increase of salary; from township treasurer, incidental expenses in connection with township work, \$20.75; from Mrs. Thompson, account for bread furnished Mrs. Hanley, \$5.40.

Moved by Mr. Thos. Kells, seconded by Mr. D. McMillan, that the account of C. W. Rutledge for printing assessment rolls amounting to \$12.60 be paid, and that the reeve issue his order for payment of same. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Thos. Kells, seconded by Mr. D. McMillan, that six dollars be refunded to the Royal Templars, they having found their own light and fuel while they used the hall. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Thos. Kells, seconded by Mr. Geo. Thompson, that the treasurer be instructed to pay the county treasurer on or before July 1st \$2600 on by law 334 maturing in September. Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. Sharp, seconded by Mr. D. McMillan, that the clerk and reeve be instructed to ascertain proportion of non resident land found due to Markdale corporation and furnish statement to treasurer, who is hereby authorized to remit said amount. Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. Sharp, seconded by Mr. G. Thompson, that the reeve, and clerk, and Mr. McMillan be a committee to finally audit the auditors' report. Carried.

Moved by Mr. D. McMillan, seconded by Mr. Wm. Sharp, that a committee be appointed to investigate the matter contained in the petition of William Meeds and others and report upon the same at May council meeting. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Sharp, seconded by Mr. Thompson, that following accounts be paid: W. J. Bellamy \$13.85 for registering; Mrs. Thompson, bread for Mrs. Hanley \$5.40. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by D. McMillan, that the account of Daniel McDonnell for \$2.25 for building culvert on town line between Proton and Artemesia be paid. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kells, seconded by Mr. Thompson, that the acct. and application of J. W. Armstrong be left over until next Council meeting, and that he be requested to attend said Council meeting. Carried.

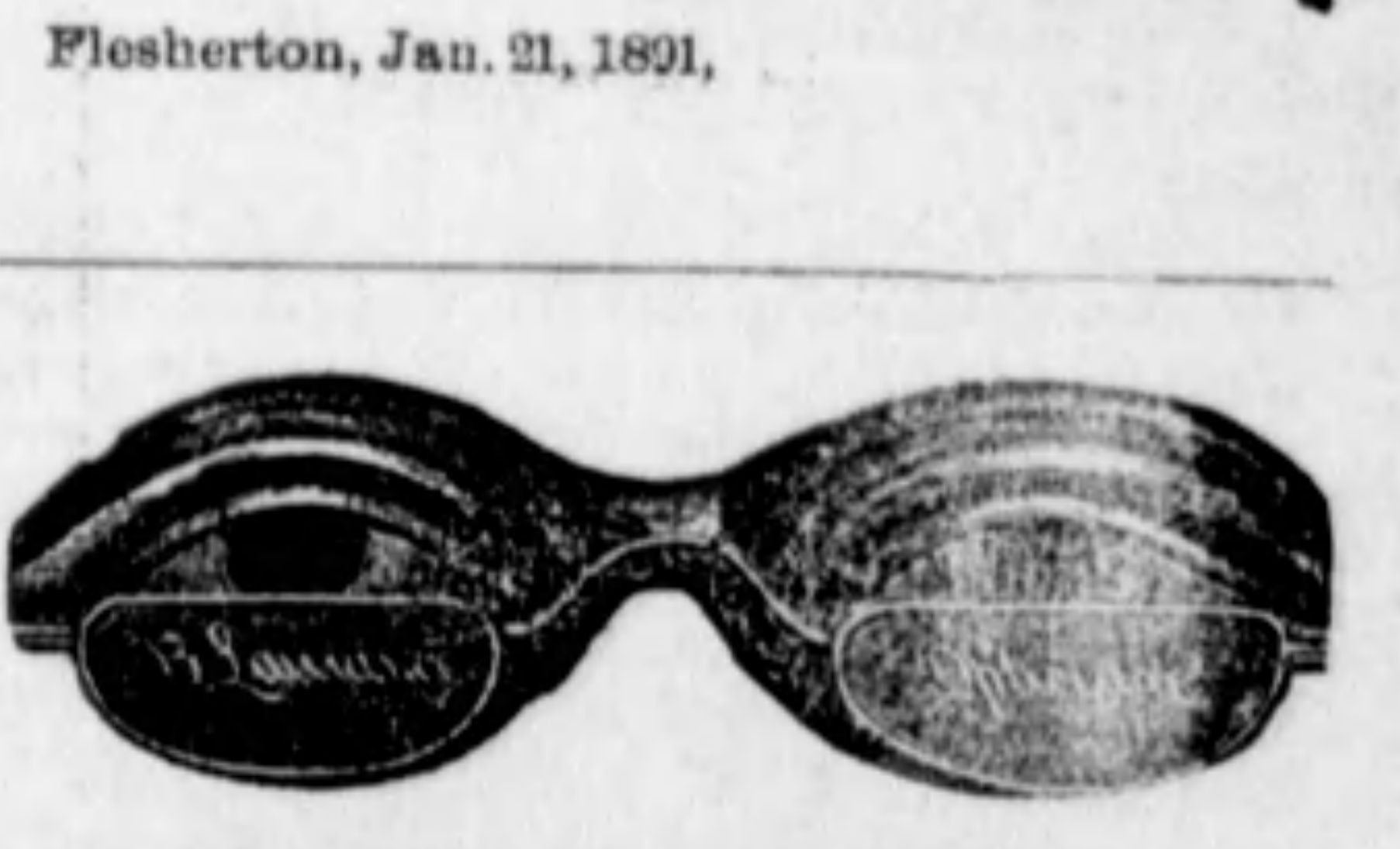
