Owen Sound Sun.

The Cambria will not sail from this
port the coming season. It is reported
the Carmona will run on Lake Ontario.

The magnificent steamships of the
C. P. R. line, which were built at the
Polsons' shipyard here, the Glasgow of
Canada, will all be ready for the opening
of navigation. The Manitoba will make
her first trip over the lakes on the open-
ing of the Soo canal. She is the finest
steel steamship on fresh water, and she
will be gladly welcomed along the route
to Port Arthur.

Georgian Bay is clear of ice and an
early opening of navigation is anticipated.

The Sun says it knows spring is at
hand, because "poetry peculiar to the
season is daily arriving at that office."

The next meeting of the Provincial

Owen sound.

THE ASSIZES.

The assizes opened here Monday after-
noon, Justice MacMahon presiding.
There were no criminal cases, and only
11 on the civil docket—seven jury and
four non-jury.

Flaming vs. Bricker—Defendant lives
in Port Elgin; plaintiff in town. Action
to recover price of a piano—\$225. Judg-
ment entered for plaintiff with costs.
Frost & McKay and J. W. Frost for
pltf.; W. Burgess of Port Elgin for de-
fendant.

Hardie vs. Hardie—The parties belong
to Artemesia. Disagreement between fa-
ther and son as to an agreement. Settled
out of court. H. G. Tucker for plaintiff;
Frost & McKay for defendant.

Gould vs. Erskine—Parties live in Euphrasia. Seduction. Verdict for plain-
tiff, \$25. P. McCullough for plaintiff;
Mr. Myers for defendant.

Woodman vs. Hunt—Action to enforce
performance of trust. Settled between
parties after argument. Z. A. Lash, Q.C.,
and T. H. Dyre for pltf.; Austin Flet-
cher and W. A. Bishop for deft.

Waston vs. Huron & Middlesex—Ac-
tion on insurance policy. Settled be-
tween parties. John Creasor for pltf.;
W. W. Fitzgerald for deft.

Boyd vs. Jones—Action of ejectment.
Adjudged. John Creasor for pltf.; J.
M. Kilbourn for deft.

Chapman vs. Dunn—An action arising
out of the collision between the tug
Annie Watt and the steamer Alderson,
Aug. 13, last year, in which the former
vessel was sunk. This case occupied the
attention of the court Tuesday and Wed-
nesday. Judgment reserved. John

In Meaford the police have an effectual
way of frightening juvenile disturbers
of the peace, but a way not likely to com-
mand respect for sober law and justice.
It appears that Rev. Dr. Stone's Bible
class drove out to a church tea-meeting
in St. Vincent, taking a number of tin
horns with them. They did considerable
blowing—which is a characteristic of
Meaford people. The next day each one
of the class was served with a summons
to appear before a magistrate. They
were considerably frightened, till some
one discovered that the magistrate in
question had forgotten to dot down his
autograph on the summonses.—[Thorn-
bury Standard.

The only criminal case at the Guelph
assizes was tried last Thursday. William
Coutts, of Mount Forest, was placed in
the dock charged with the serious crime
of murdering his little daughter. It will
be remembered that last fall a child was
found drowned in a cistern in Mount
Forest. On investigation it turned out
that the child belonged to Coutts, and
the circumstances of the child's death at
once aroused suspicion that it was a case
of foul play. Coutts was arrested, charged
with the crime, and was committed for
trial by the coroner's jury. The trial re-
sulted in the prisoner's acquittal on the
ground of insanity. Neither the prisoner
nor his friends secured the services of a
lawyer to defend him, and no effort had
been made to work up a defence. The
judge charged strongly against the pris-
oner but the jury brought in a verdict of
acquittal after one hour's deliberation.

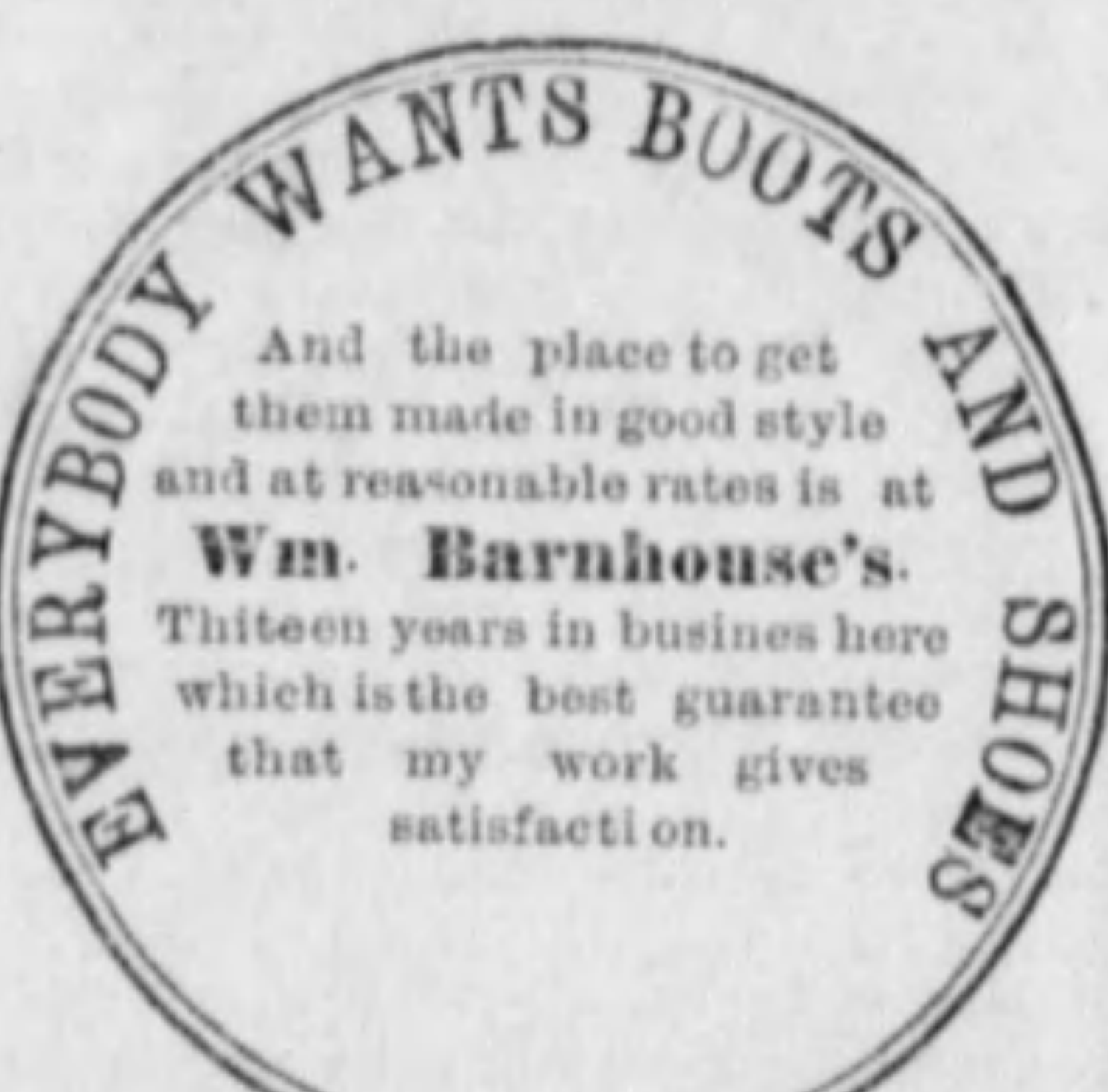
