Artemesia Parliament.

The regular monthly meeting of Artemesia's township Parliament convened in the Town Hall on Monday last with all the members in their places. It was a long session and only came to a close as the shades of night came down and rendered things obscure around the Council board. There were two or three small deputations present during the day. Among those who interviewed the Council on various matters were Mr. Wm. Hogg, of Toronto, Mr. Warling, J. W. Armstrong, treasurer, and others. The clerk handed in the following communications: From Jonathan Latimer, pathmaster, re shovelling snow; from Jas. Watson and others re statute labor, Priceville; certificate from R. Black, re temporary bridge on town line Artemesia and Proton; report of committee re Markdale non resident lands; from Mayor of Orangeville, re railway deputation to Ottawa. Accounts were read from W. J. Bellamy, for quarter's salary, \$37.50; from Wm. Clayton, wood for town hall, \$2.50. The auditors' quarterly statement showed a balance of \$2,000.92 to the credit of the township on April 1.

Moved by G. Thompson, seconded by D. McMillan, that in reference to the account of Jonathan Latimer this Council cannot entertain it as the law respecting statute labor allows persons opening snow roads pay on their next year's labor upon certificate of pathmaster, who orders the work to be done. Carried.

Moved by Wm. Sharp, seconded by G. Thompson, that the following accounts be paid: To W. J. Bellamy, one quarter's salary as clerk to first April, 1891, \$37.50; Wm. Clayton, 24 cords wood for township hall, \$2.50. Carried.

Moved by D. McMillan, seconded by Thos. Kells, that the petition of William Meads and others be referred to a committee composed of the Reeve and Mr. Sharp to report upon the same at the next meeting of this Council. Carried.

Moved by Thos. Kells, seconded by Wm. Sharp, that the auditors' report as finally audited by committee of the Council be adopted. Carried.

Moved by G. Thompson, seconded by W. Sharp, that the Reeve issue his order for \$5.00, being Artemesia's share of temporary bridge on the Saugeen on town line between Artemesia and Proton. Carried.

Moved by Thos. Kells, seconded by Geo. Thompson, that the ward appropriations for the current year, 1891, be as follows: Ward No. 1, \$200; ward No. 2, \$200; ward No. 3, \$280; ward No. 4, \$200. Total \$880. And this resolution shall not prejudice the giving of a larger amount for the purpose of improving roads should circumstance admit of so doing. Carried.

Moved by Geo. Thompson, seconded by W. Sharp, that upon certificates of road commissioners the Reeve is hereby authorized to issue cheques for payment of road jobs during 1891. Carried.

Moved by Thos. Kells, seconded by D. McMillan, that bylaw No. 473, as amended, appointing pathmasters, pound-keepers and fenceviewers for the year 1891, be read a third time, signed sealed and engrossed in bylaw book. Carried.

Moved by D. McMillan, seconded by Wm. Sharp, that the petition of James Watson and others lay on the table until the next meeting of this Council. Carried.

This being all of the business the Council adjourned.

Gardiner vs. Friend.—Parties live near Thornbury. Action brought by Mrs. Gardiner for damages for alleged breach of an agreement to raise and properly clothe and keep, &c., her daughter. The girl lived with the defendant for several years. Judgment for Defendant, Geo. Moberly for Plff.; Lash Q. C., and Dyre for Deft.

Spencer vs. McLelland.—Action and counter-action for slander. Parties live in Sullivan. Plaintiff claimed \$1000 damages. Judgement for Plaintiff for \$50. Kilbourn & Kilbourn for Plff.; Frost & McKay for Deft.

Woodman vs. Hunt.—It will be remembered that at the suggestion of the Judge the parties withdrew from Court for the purpose of endeavoring to effect a settlement. Agreement arrived at whereby the Plaintiffs Lucy Woodman and Thos. Hunt received \$550. Fletcher, Q. C., and W. Bishop for Plffs.; Lash, Q. C., and Dyre for Deft.

Kilbourn vs. Manley.—Action on an agreement for the sale of the Manley farm. Consent verdict for Plaintiff; Defendant to have three months to redeem. W. A. Bishop for Plff.; Masson & Masson for Deft.

Action brought by the administrator of the estate of the late Anne Maria Dean against his brother for having taken possession and control of all the chattels. Defence—Chattels were bought and paid for. Case adjourned to Chancery sittings in April. Crescor and Skinner for Plff.; Frost & McKay for Deft.

Watson vs. Huron & Middlesex Fire Insurance Co.—Plaintiff lives in Egremont and sued for insurance money on a barn and saw-mill destroyed by fire. Consent judgement for Plaintiff for \$1300. J. P. Telford for Plff.; Fitzgerald for Defts.
