**Artemesia Council.**

Artemesia council met on Monday, 1st inst., as a court of revision. All the members were present and after being duly sworn business of the day was entered upon.

Mr. J. H. Stuart petitioned to have the name of Geo. McFarland entered upon the roll in place of himself. Mr. W. R. Dyson desired to have his sons entered upon the roll as joint owners instead of farmer's sons. Dr. J. G. Hutton requested to be entered on the roll of 1891 for E. J. 2, Kinross st. S., Priceville. Dr. Christie desired to have certain of his premises assessed to Samuel Pedlar instead of to Messrs. Petch & Mitchell. The above appeals were all granted by the court, and upon motion the assessment roll for 1891 as amended by the court was made the standing assessment for the township for the current year.

Court arose and Council went into session, the reeve in the chair.

Communications were read from: Mr. S. Damude, declining office as road over-

seer; from Mr. C. C. James, Priceville, re commutation of statute labor; from Samuel Henderson asking to be allowed to purchase original road allowance at 14 and 15, 1st T. & S. R.; petition from Mr. J. I. Graham and a number of others re deviation at lot 22, con. 13; and a petition from ratepayers of Priceville opposed to the council's action at last meeting rescinding the bylaw commuting statute labor. Accounts were read from John Rutherford, for printing and stationery, \$6.75; and from Mrs. Thompson, bread for Mrs. Hanley, \$4.

The accounts of Mr. Rutherford and Mrs. Thompson were upon motion, passed.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Thompson, that the reeve, deputy reeves and councillors of this municipality be and are hereby appointed a road and bridge committee for the current year, 1891, to make and improve roads and bridges within the limits of this municipality. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Sharp and McMillan, that the commissioners for each ward be paid the following amounts: Ward No. 1, Donald McMillan, \$16; No. 2, Thos. Kells, \$16; No. 3, Wm. Sharp, \$22.40; No. 4, Geo. Thompson, \$16. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Sharp, that the reeve be and is hereby requested to order twelve road scrapers from Wm. Strain at prices set forth in his tender, viz. \$8.25 per scraper, to be delivered at Flesherton free of any other charge. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Sharp, that the reeve and mover be a committee to examine the deviation mentioned in the petition of J. I. Graham and others, likewise the deviation applied for by Mr. Williams, and report at the next meeting of Council. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Sharp and McMillan, that Wm. McLoughrey be paid eighty dollars, being salary as assessor for 1891, also five dollars for postage and stationery, total \$85, and that the reeve issue his order for the same. Carried.

Bylaw No. 474, forming a new road division of lots 34 to 45 in the third range, S. D. R., and appointing Richard Hargrave as overseer, was passed in open council.

Messrs. Jas. Nelson, Samuel Thompson, Charles Lyons, Wm. Ludlow, Samuel Wright and R. & A. Nelson, have entered into an agreement to clear obstructions from stream which runs across lots 186 to 190 2nd S. D. R.

**Osprey Council.**

Osprey council met as a court of revision on June 1st in the Orange Hall Maxwell.

**APPEALS.**

George Wright on mill property, reduced \$1000; John Ottewell, Angus Cameron, Hugh Lamont, assessment sustained. Geo. Lush appealed to have lot 13, Wellington St., Feversham, assessed to him as owner instead of Geo. Whiteoak. Assessment sustained. Wm. McLemin, assessment sustained. Jas. Thompson, east half lot 14, con. 13, reduced \$100. A large amount of alterations and corrections were ordered, and the roll finally confirmed.

Council met for general business after Court of Revision. Minutes of last meeting read and signed.

Communications read from The Advance Office, bill \$1.43, advt. of court of revision. Petition from Angus Cameron and 36 others re gravelly valley road. From Co. treasurer, arrears of taxes, lot 5, 2 S. D. R. From Williams' estate, Maxwell, bill \$1.50, goods furnished to indigent in 1886. Petition from residents of Maxwell, asking privilege to do statute labor building sidewalks in Maxwell.

The reeve's order was issued on the treasurer for the following amounts: Advance office, \$1.43; Samuel Taylor, salary as assessor, \$80; Postage, \$2; Thos. Scott, express, 85 cents; members of Assessment Committee, clerk and assessor included, \$2 each; Joseph Brown \$2, assisting surveyor on deviation, con. 14.

The clerk was instructed to notify the county treasurer to erase arrears of taxes against lot 5, con. 2, S. D. R., the parties having produced receipt that taxes were paid.

The bill of Williams' estate, re indigent, was laid over for further consideration.

James Potts was allowed to perform 6 days statute labor for lot 75, con. 2, N. D. R., and the treasurer instructed to receive the taxes on said \$6 less on receipt from path-master.

The sum of \$100 was appropriated to each of the divisions of this township for roads, and the following parties are commissioners to expend the same: Div. No. 1, Wm. J. Monaghan; Div. No. 2, Thos. Gamey; Div. No. 3, D. K. Preston; Div. No. 4, Joseph Brown; Div. No. 5, Joseph Taylor.

A special grant of \$325 was made to repair roads and bridges in the township, to be divided as follows: Div. No. 1, Dundalk road, \$75; No. 2, bridge over Beaver river on 10th side road, \$75; No. 3, for townline Artemesia and Osprey, \$50; No. 4, Valley Road, \$50; east end of gravel road \$25; No. 5, townline Melancthon and Osprey west, 30th sideroad \$50.

The residents of Maxwell are allowed to do their statute labor building sidewalks in above named village.

The matter of Geo. Lush and township of Osprey re lot 17, Wellington st., Feversham, was laid over till next meeting of council.

Council adjourned to meet in the Orange hall, Badjeros, July 6th next.
