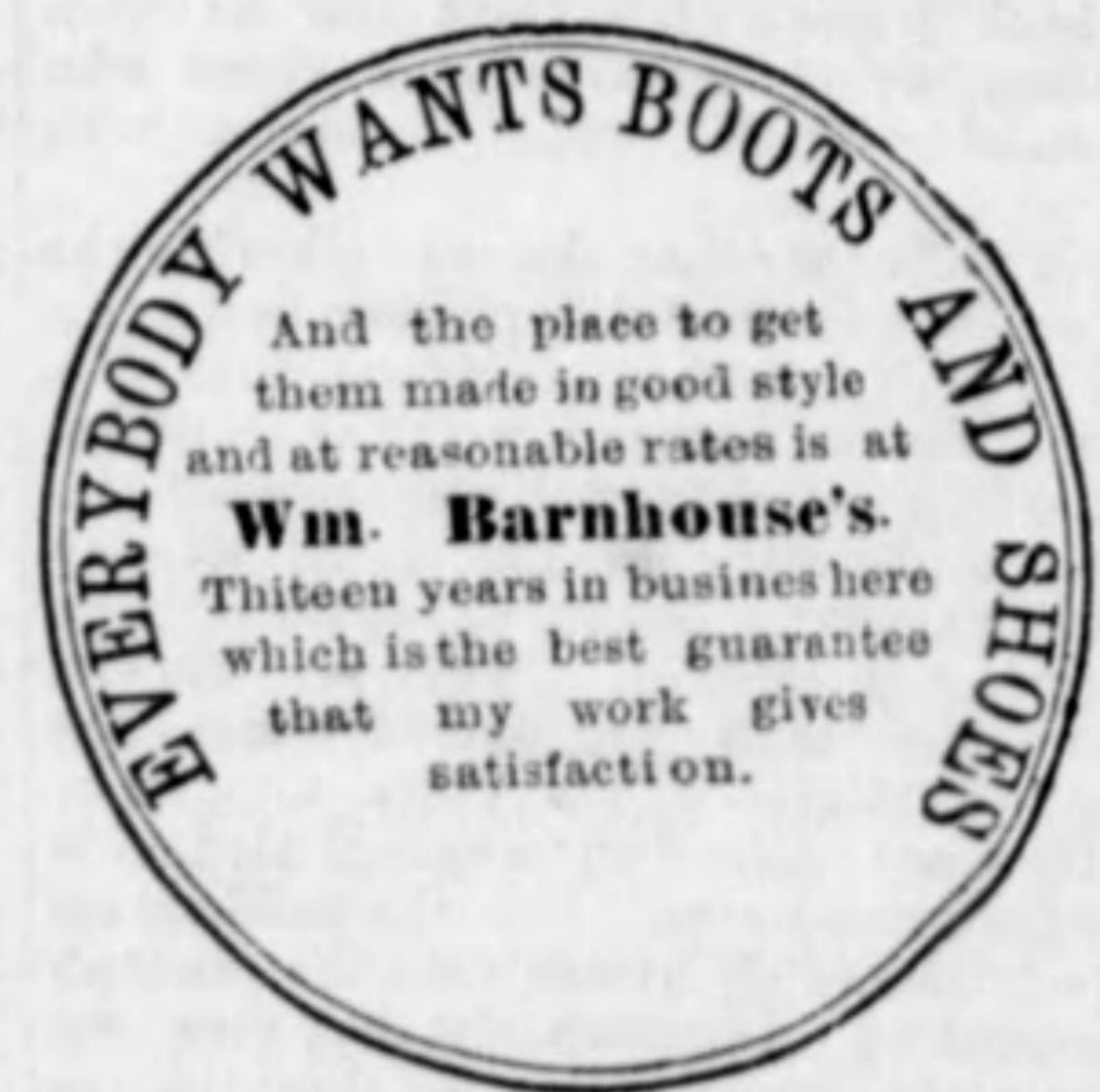

Osprey Council.

Osprey Council met in the Orange Hall, Feversham, on Monday, Aug. 17th.

Members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and signed.

Communications read from County Clerk, statement of rates for 1891, viz., County rate, \$1338.80, school equivalent, \$400; Provincial Treasury Department re payment of land improvement fund; Herald office, Dundalk, bill \$42.00, printing voters' list of 1891; R. Coutts, pathmaster, certificate of performance of statute labor on lots 32, con. 3, S. D. R., by Wm. J. Adair, for years '87, '88, '89 and '90; Advance office, Flesherton, bill 75 cents, printing posters; Robt. Heron, bill \$2, plan for bridge on 10th side road; petition from James Gilles and others, re grant to repair town line C. and O., opposite lot 35; petition from A. McTeggart and others re grant to repair townline C. and O., opposite lot 37; Thos. B. Gilliland, P. L. S., report of deviation road across lot 30 and 31, con. 14, and bill for same, \$17.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid: Jno. Paul, 90 cents, repairing road scraper; Thos. B. Gilliland, \$17, surveying; Robt. Heron, \$2, plan for bridge; Advance office, 75 cents; Theo. Hall, \$42, printing voters' list; Wm. J. Adair, \$12, refund on statute labor, lot 32, 3 S. D. R.; Thos. Scott, \$20, copying assessment roll for county clerk.

The commissioner of Div. No. 4 was instructed to examine the townline C. and O., opposite lots 35 and 37, and find out what amount it will take to put it in proper repair, and report at next meeting.

The report of Thos. B. Gilliland, P. L. S., re deviation road across lots 30 and 31, con. 14, was adopted, and the Clerk instructed to advertise the proposed By Law.

Mr. Joseph Taylor was appointed to examine the Mud Lake on south line and report the probable cost of draining the lake, and report at next meeting.

The commissioner of Div. No. 3 was instructed to examine the bridge opposite lot 18, con. 10 and 11, and also the crossway on 20th side road in con. 9, and if necessary, get it repaired.

The sum of \$20 was granted to the commissioner of Div. No. 1 to expend on the 40th side road in con. 2, N. D. R.

The commissioner of Div. No. 5, was instructed to examine the gravel pit opposite lot 78, con. 3, N. D. R., and also a culvert opposite lot 73, con. 3, and get the same put in a safe condition.

The sum of \$15 was granted the commissioner of Div. No. 4 to expend on the 30th sideroad, con. 11.

A special grant of \$15 was given to be expended on the 25th sideroad between cons. 11 and 12, and Richard Hawton was appointed to expend the same.

By Laws 288 to assess and levy rates, and By Law No. 289 to appoint collectors of rates received their several readings and finally passed.

Duncan McInnes is appointed collector for the south half of the township at a salary of \$50. Archy McPhail and Donald McIntyre were approved of as bondsmen.

James Elliot is appointed collector for north half of the township at a salary of \$55. Geo. Davidson and George Hale were approved of as bondsmen.

Council adjourned to meet at McIntyre on Monday, October 19th next.
