China is hitting back at the American people for their treatment of Chinese immigrants. The missionaries who go from this country find it hard to convince the followers of Confucius that they represent a more enlightened and God-fearing race, who possess the only true religion. This perversity is quite remarkable, when one takes into consideration the righteous manner in which our people welcome the heathens among them!

A war scare is once more on the tapis in Europe, and from the same old cause. Russia has secured possession of the Dardanelles by diplomacy, and this is looked upon by the other powers as being proof positive that their suspicions of Russia's intentions to possess Constantinople were well founded. England has taken possession and fortified an island in the Aegean, 60 miles from Constantinople, in order to hunt the bear when he begins his nosing around the city of the Sultan. Austria sees that her interests are threatened by Russia's treaty breaking act, and will protest strongly. For some months past Russia has been mobilizing troops on the German frontier, and is at present engaged in shipping arms and munition of war through the Dardanelles into the Black Sea provinces. Everything points towards a heavy and immediate consumption of war material by Russia, and it is not at all improbable that within the next year or two Europe will be convulsed by the terrors of a great war.

At the last meeting of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association a committee was appointed to draft a report on the varieties of apples most suitable to the various districts of Ontario, and this committee have reported on the following varieties for the counties of Huron, Grey and Bruce: Summer—Yellow Transparent and Duchess of Oldenburg. Autumn—Gravenstein, Wealthy and Colvert. Winter—Pewaukee, Ontario, Baldwin, Hubbardston's Nonsuch and Cranberry Pippin. While the report doubtless is of much value as a whole, we believe the districts should have been again subdivided and embrace a much smaller extent of territory, especially in the three counties named, owing to variation of temperature and climatic differences. For instance, in this township it has been proven that the Baldwin apple is not a success, while in the bordering township of Euphrasia it succeeds splendidly. Indeed so closely is this line drawn that at one point, within a distance of one mile, both success and non success have been demonstrated, and all owing to protection of the trees and difference in altitude. What we want to know in this section is, the varieties suitable to the townships of Artemesia, Proton, Qaprey, and Glenelg. At all events the Baldwin does not appear to be one of them.
