

The Northern for 1891.

These daring aerial performers ascend in their balloon to the clouds and from that tremendous height drop from their balloon and for nearly 1000 feet descend with awful velocity when their frail parachute begins gradually to open and they descend to mother earth in safety. The managing committee have secured the services of some of the best acrobatic performers in the country who will without doubt please all those interested in the performance of such daring feats. Tom Edison, "The Wizard Inventor" has given this age many wonderful inventions but none more pleasing and instructive than this wonderful machine the Phonograph which will be at the Northern. Through this machine can be heard, exactly as rendered, selections from different operas as sung by Patti, the voice of Gladston the Grand Old Man as he thunders forth arguments in the House of Commons, London, England, or the comic songs of Joe Murphy. A large Grand Stand has been built which will command a view of every thing going on in the ground.

Mr. Justice Falconbridge opened Court yesterday at 2 p.m. There are on the Civil Docket eleven cases, and on the criminal but three. The following Grand Jurors answered the roll call:

Paterson, Euphrasia; Chas. Fry, Egremont; Wm. Whitelaw, St. Vincent; Thomas Phillips, Egremont; David R. Dobie, Owen Sound; James Wallace, Collingwood.

Mr. William Lemon, Reeve of Sydenham, was chosen Foreman. His Lordship addressed the Grand Jurors with reference to the different criminal cases that the Crown Attorney had to lay before them, clearly and fully explaining the law. After a two hours deliberation they brought in a True Bill for Larceny in the case of Reg. vs. Barber.

The first case on the Civil Docket was Norman vs. Connor.—This was an action for damages for slander of the Plaintiff's daughter. The parties live at Williamsford. The case occupied all afternoon.
