To the Editor of The Advance.

DEAR SIR,—I was quite surprised in reading The Advance last week to notice the hot-headed denunciation which Mr. Richardson was pleased to pour upon the head of "R. T." It appears to me that he did not read my protest with the calm analysis with which he is usually credited, otherwise he would not have attributed to me statements and sentiments which I never expressed and never felt. I deny in toto that there was anything "spiteful" or "malicious" in what I wrote. Neither did I make any "invidious" or other comparison between "Mr. Tonge and his predecessor," and I defy Mr. Richardson to extort any such meaning from the following words: "Former ministers avoided conflicting in this way, and were themselves identified with the temperance work here." What is there wrong about that? Is it not true? Rev. Mr. Watson was one of the most vigorous workers in the temperance cause, and his removal was a matter of deep regret to every temperance man and woman in Flesherton. It is unnecessary for me to name the other ministers who identified themselves with either one society or the other and kept in touch with the temperance people. While I never intended to censure Mr. Tonge for not joining the societies, I believe that had he done so the three meetings referred to would not all have been held on a Tuesday night. The dairy maid's social for instance. Why did I not "call the attention of the minister or other officer of the church, to the expressed desire of the members of the order?" That question shows Mr. Richardson's unfitness to champion his cause. That very thing was done, and done more than once, as I am prepared to prove. The Royal templars, I feel sure, would never demur at their meeting night being made use of by any church when such was unavoidable, but when, three nights out of four, their meetings were called away by church meetings, until it was impossible to do necessary business, I, as an individual member and having the welfare of the lodge at heart, felt that something more drastic was required than merely drawing the attention of the "minister or other officer" to the grievance for a third or fourth time. I did this on my own responsibility, however, and had I been a member of the Sons, with parallel circumstances, would have done the same thing. As for "cheek," "impudence," "dictation," "indecency," "spite," "mischievous and malicious statements," and "unfounded charges," these are strong adjectives, and I am surprised at Mr. Richardson making use of them. They show a rather too warm temper for the occasion. His claim with regard to the church temperance society is untrue and absurd, and he knows it. All who are acquainted with the circumstances express surprise that he should so deliberately falsify matters. Every Royal Templar with whom I have spoken feels that the society has a grievance, and they feel, too, that this exposition will have the effect of knitting their members more closely together. An old enemy hath fallen upon them and they are "on guard." I will not follow Mr. R. back over the past and rake over old sores, but cannot allow his sneering allusion to Mrs. Smith and Irish to pass without censure. The very fact that these worthy christian men are still in the work, and among the most honored temperance evangelists in the country, should make some members of the Methodist church in this place blush with shame at the unchristian way in which these gentlemen were received while among us. Suspicion and hatred and fiery denunciation were rampant then, but we had hoped that these were forgotten. If Mr. Richardson is desirous, as appears from his letter, to injure the Royals over the head of R. T., let me say to him that I hope his better wisdom will prevail before go-

ing any farther. The Royals regard themselves as a christian society and as such desire to retain the sympathy of church people and to work in harmony with the church, and have always done so. I repeat, they have always done so. They now hesitate to accept Mr. Richardson's hastily written sentiments as being those of the majority of Methodist people. I do not desire to pursue this matter further. My object has been gained. My identity may be known or it may not. I do not care. I have listened to a lot of abuse from church members since my short epistle appeared, and I cannot help but compare it to some of Paul's teachings, and compare it in a very unfavorable light, being as I am, conscious of having done that which was right and necessary if the autonomy of my society is to be retained. 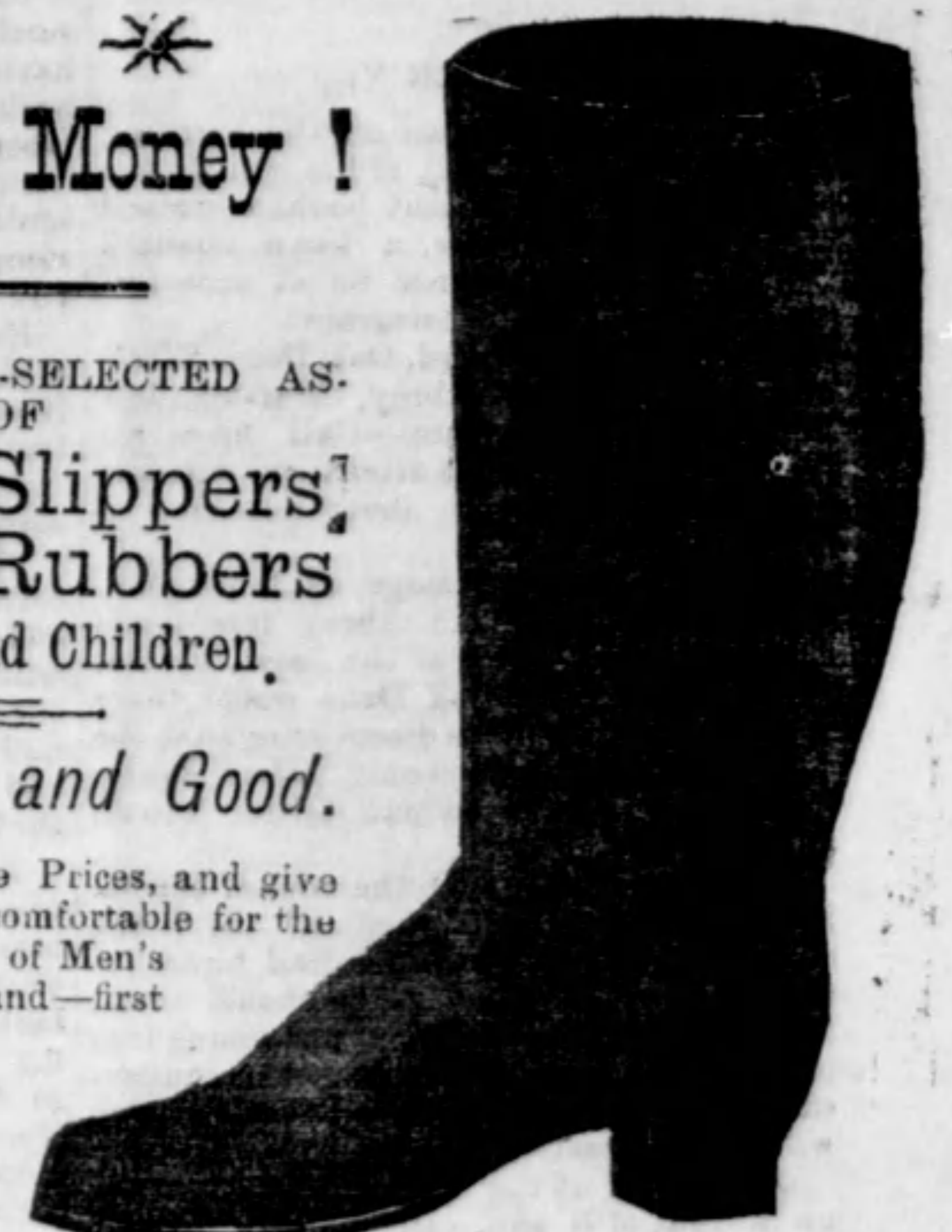

REGIMENTAL ORDERS:

No. 1. The several companies of the regiment will proceed to camp, Niagara, on Tuesday, the sixth of October. Route requisitions will be forwarded to officers commanding companies.

No. 2. Men will be in heavy marching order with helmets; Officers in undress with forage caps and brown dog skin gloves. All officers must have with them full dress uniform; the usual kit and camp equipment will be brought along.

No. 3. No officer will be exempted from attending camp except on sick leave, and officers are notified that it is equally as incumbent on them as on the men to attend this camp.
