Farming Aphorisms.

"You can never put too much water in milk if you always put it through the cow's mouth." This is one of many analogous aphorisms by Professor Robertson, the Canadian dairy commissioner. Among his duties is that of delivering lectures to farmers throughout the country. Of late years the Dominion Government has adopted many wise measures for improving Canadian agriculture. Experimental farms have been established in widely-separated provinces, and placed under men who are at once practical and scientific farmers. They conduct and report on attempts to acclimatize new varieties of grain and fruits. They experiment on methods of feeding stock, and carefully note the results for government publication.

It is believed that a well planned system for improving the breeds of cattle, horses and hogs throughout all Canada, will be soon taken in hand by the administration. This would add greatly to the value of the permanent "living plant" of the people, and to "practical politics" in the best sense. Meantime the wide circulation by that government of the Dairy Commissioner's admirable lectures will go far to impress farmers with the folly of continuing some old practices. Here are a few more of his telling aphorisms.

"Some farmers are wont to think that what they call sentiment belongs to literary people alone, people who wear long hair and use a good deal of hair oil. But if you can put right sentiment into a farmer's life and make him feel proud of his business, he will do that business the better for it, and such sentiment to him will prove a paying acquisition."

"The hog is not such an undesirable citizen if he is well fed and well kept. He is the one citizen of the American Republic that has helped most to make it wealthy. Of course I mean the kind of hogs that are fed in pens. Even little pigs have a right to be well born, but they cannot be if their mother lacks a clean home and clean, sweet food."

"A man who knows well enough that unless his dairy cow be a good one he can expect no profit from her, often acts as though he believed that anything which grunts and squeals would make money for him out of its food; but the grunting and squealing are the main part with some hogs."

"Many of the troughs I see around the country seem to have been constructed to afford baths to the pigs, so deep and wide are they."

"There is only one way whereby a man can raise, with certainty and equity, the price of his butter. No single farmer and no combination of farmers can force the butter market up or down. But any man can raise himself from being a ten-cent-a-pound man to being a twenty-five-cent-a-pound man, by making and marketing the quality of butter for which people will pay twenty-five cents."

COUNTY AND DISTRICT. The new fishery cruiser now under construction at Owen Sound will be launched to-day (Thursday). Daniel C. Taylor, living near Owen Sound, aged 38 years, fell off a load of turnips, was run over and killed, leaving a wife and six children. The Mt. Forest Representative man denies that he is the father of thirty-seven children and pronounces the insinuation a "screaming farce." Mr. John O'Connor, who resides in the township of Derby, had a novel experience driving to town last Sunday evening. On arriving here it was ascertained he had rode in his buggy, with not only no tire on one wheel, but the fellos were also gone, nothing but the spokes remaining in the hub.

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Farming Aphorisms.

A party of local Nimrods went out to the neighborhood of Foversham on Tuesday to shoot deer. They saw several fine animals, but shot none, though every man in the party had his shot except mine host Collins, of the Central, who was unfortunate. One of the deer seen just about jumped over the head of Deputy-Reeve O'Brien, but though he let both barrels go, the deer got away—[Collingwood Enterprise. No wonder he got away, dear Enterprise. Mr. E. T. Williams, V. S., of Sunderland, operated on a cow last week belonging to Mr. McDermott, of Pinedale, township of Brock, and abstracted from the thoracic cavity a large label fork, she having swallowed it last spring. It passed through the anterior part of the rumen through the diaphragm alongside of the lungs to the fifth rib whence it was abstracted. The weather was too fine for much large game, and one day Mr. Climie shot an immense brown owl which was flying about in the woods. When his owlship came to earth our quill-driving friend rushed forward to secure his game, and unthinkingly picked the bird up by the wing. Quick as a flash the owl seized Mr. Climie by the wrist with its talons, which it sunk deep into his flesh and he was perfectly helpless, his other hand being kept busy in keeping the infuriated bird from his face. He screamed for aid. Mr. Will Tyson was luckily within hearing distance, and rushed to his aid. Mr. Tyson tried to choke the bird, but it managed to catch one of his hands in the other claw, and for a time the noble bird had the two handcuffed together in good shape.
