Wood cutting is the order of the day around S. P. at present. This reminds us that there has been a great revolution in the manner of wood cutting these last few years, which has been largely owing to the general introduction of cross-cut saws as the principal implement in cutting wood. Ten years ago one farmer out of every ten did not possess a cross cut saw, now the tables are turned. Now-a-days the sharp crack of the axe is hardly ever heard in the bush except in trimming tree-tops, etc., but instead the swift rushing and pleasant whizz, whizz of the cross-cut saw echoes through the woods. The smooth, flat-topped stumps also evidence the fact that saws are now even used in felling the giants of the forest while the axe occupies an humble position in some snow bank near by. Another noticeable fact is the number of farmer's sons who can "set and file" a saw to perfection. Formerly the service of the village carpenter was required for this somewhat delicate manipulation, but now the sturdy yeomen do the business themselves and thus save their dimes. Of course some attain to a greater degree of excellence in this avocation than others, and often to their sorrow, for the kindly neighbors generally furnish him with plenty of work on stormy days, as J. Haw, the good-natured "saw doctor," of S. P. well knows. When a saw is in good "trim" the amount of wood that can be cut in a day would astonish the axemen of years ago. Five cords of stove wood "split and piled" is now an average day's work for a couple of strong lads of 18 or 20 years old. However, it is not every one that can "saw" properly. Sawing is not learned in a day nor a week either. Experience is the only teacher as all good and bad sawyers know. In conclusion we would say that if you have a good saw, a nice maple tree in a horizontal position and about 3 feet high from the ground, there is no more delightful and invigorating occupation in winter than "sawing wood."

Personal estate \$1045, besides Real estate devised to his wife for life, remainder equally among his children, except Henry who has already received his share, and William who is to receive only \$300, and George who receives \$1500, over his share.
