COUNTY AND DISTRICT.

Mr. J. Anderson, grain-dealer, of Dundalk, has lost his life-partner through the gripe. The remains were interred on Saturday week at Maple Grove cemetery.

A heavy thunder storm, accompanied by rain, passed over Streetsville on Sunday evening. The lightning was vivid and reminded one of a storm in mid-summer. It lasted about half an hour and was an event that eclipsed the "best efforts" of the oldest inhabitant.—[Streetsville Review.

Master Hugh McRae, a school boy, of Meaford, jumped upon a loaded sleigh, fell off, and the last bob ran over his leg, breaking it. It will likely have to be amputated. The loaded bob sleigh is just as fatal as the "didn't know 'twas loaded" gup. Children should keep away from both.

Mr. W. Keogh, who left Invermay four years ago, has returned. On leaving there he shipped on a whaling vessel at New Bedford, Mass., and after eight months deserted at Montevideo, South America, where he spent over two years, and then returned to New York and home. Bill's experience would make a rattling good story, and he will be the hero for many a day.

An extremely sad death took place here this week in the sudden demise of Mrs. R. Dobson. She was taken sick but a few days ago, with the prevailing disease la grippe, and rapidly grew worse and breathed her last on Sunday. To make the case sadder her husband was absent from home in the North-West, a telegram was sent him as soon as she was taken ill, but he did not arrive until Wednesday. Three small children are left motherless.—[Warton Echo.

On the 29th inst., Victor Belanger, a young axe man of Gatineau Point, came down from the woods to see his aged father and mother. He found the house locked up, and after waiting some time he concluded that his parents were in and forced an entrance. He found his mother dead in bed and his father lying unconscious on the sofa.

The Spring Assizes in the north-western circuit will be held as follows before His Lordship Chief Justice Armour: Woodstock, Wednesday, March 2nd; Stratford, Monday, March 7th; Goderich, Monday, March 14th; Walkerton, Monday, March 21st; Guelph, Monday, March 28th; Berlin, Tuesday, April 5th; Brantford, Monday, April 11th; Owen Sound, Tuesday, April 19th.

Mrs. Jas. Robinson, an indigent from Mulmur township, died in the Orangeville jail on Friday last. She had been an inmate of that institution for the past three years. The deceased and her husband once owned the farm now occupied and owned by Mr. Robt. Clark, of Whitfield. They sold the property about 14 years ago to the late Paul Gallagher, who was to pay them \$120 per year as long as they lived. The amount was paid regularly until Mr. Robinson died. After that date the widow received \$60 per year. When Mr. Gallagher died the payments ceased and the old lady was sent to jail as an indigent.—[Shelburne Free Press.

The case of Annie Wannamaker, a vagrant girl of fourteen years of age, came before Magistrate Denison in Toronto. The case is an interesting and somewhat complicated one. The girl had been a resident of the county of Bruce until about a year ago, when she was sent by the police authorities of Walkerton to Toronto, her father being then in gaol and her mother dead. The industrial school for girls not being open at that time, she was taken care of by the Salvation Army until the school was opened in October last. At the time of her admittance to the industrial school she was ordered to be kept there by Magistrate Denison until she was sixteen years of age, and the cost of her maintenance directed to be paid by the county of Bruce under the statute that provides that when the offender has been a resident of the municipality for a year previous of the committal the cost of maintenance shall be paid by that municipality. W. H. Blake, acting for the county of Bruce, applied for the release of the county from liability, urging that as the girl had been supported by the Salvation Army she was not a vagrant. This, however, to the Colonel's mind was conclusive proof of her vagrancy, admitting as it did her inability to support herself. He refused to entertain the claim and upheld the previous decision. It is understood the Salvation Army has applied to the county of Bruce for reimbursements for expenses incurred in keeping the girl.
