Since last issue of The Advance four bye elections have taken place, viz., London, Quebec west, Two Mountains, and Vaudreuil. In London Carling had a majority of 109 over Hyman, but as a large number of the votes are claimed to be illegal, Reform papers have taken advantage of the doubt and claim Hyman to be elected. Mr. Carling will, however, take the seat until the courts decide that he is not entitled thereto. Quebec West elected a Conservative a year ago and did so again on Friday. This was McGreevy's old constituency. Two Mountains on Saturday, and Vaudreuil on Monday, both returned government supporters by large majorities. These gains will give the government the astonishing majority of 51 votes on a division, and still there are more to come.

It is a grave situation in which Free Trade now finds itself, and the grave is so deep that the fox cannot even stick his nose out when standing on the goat's head. We would like to hear Mr. Wiman's opinion, but he is down there and cannot be got at. It is probable that neither he nor Cartwright will ever be rescued. *O mores.*
