THE QUEBEC ELECTIONS.

The general elections took place in Quebec on Tuesday of this week with the result that Mr. Mercier has been overwhelmingly defeated in the lower province. There are 78 seats in the Quebec legislature, and out of these the De Boucherville government have won 52 with four constituencies to hear from at time of writing. The Conservatives are expected to hold 55 seats when the returns are all in, which will give them a majority of 37. Montreal elected 6 Conservatives, with majorities ranging from 200 to 2,500. Mercier succeeded in holding for himself Bonaventure by about 400 majority, but with the small following at his disposal he will be perfectly harmless.

The Conservative party have already made the following gains in the bye elections thus far held: Lennox, East Bruce, Soulanges, North Victoria, West Huron, South Ontario, East Hastings, East Simcoe, London, Two Mountains, Vaudreuil—11.

Artemesia Council.

The Council of the township of Artemesia met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, on Monday, March 7, 1892.

Members all present, the reeve in the chair.

The minutes of January session were read and confirmed.

Communications as follows were presented and read, and referred to the proper committees: Inspector B. M. D., certificate of registrations, 1891; Donald Black, re damage in loss of horse getting its leg broken on town line Artemesia and Glenelg; Provincial Board of Health, certain pamphlets; James Butler re Sarah Sullivan's fire; T. B. Gilliland, re statute labor in Eugenia; J. W. Benson, pathmaster, re Geo. Lawlor's statute labor of 1391; Wm. McLoughrey, assessor, re the assessment of 1892; Petitions were received from the following parties: Arthur Johnson, et al, asking special grant on base line in rear of 3rd concession, N. E., T. & S. road, from 10th concession to 120 side road; Jas. McMullen and other ratepayers of S. S. No. 10, asking to have lots 142 to 144 in 2nd and 3rd range S. W., T. & S. road, added to said school section No. 10.

Accounts as follows were presented, viz.: C. W. Rutledge, assessment rolls and schedules, \$12.60; Jane Thompson, bread to Mrs. Hanley, \$5.40; James Stuart, road work done in 1891 on 35 sideroad under Mr. Thompson, ex councillor, \$4.40.

Report No. 1 of Road and Bridge Committee, re Eugenia bridge, stating that they had examined said bridge, and ordered repairs found necessary, to F. Kerr for \$15.00, that the work had almost been completed, and that the contractor be paid \$12 on account, and the balance when work is completed.

Report No. 2 of Road & Bridge Committee recommended that the action of pathmaster, J. W. Benson, be sustained in the matter of George Lawlor's statute labor that the matter of the petition of Arthur Johnson, et al, be laid over until appropriations are made, also recommending payment of account of James Stuart \$4.40 certified by Geo. Thompson, report of committee on Communications and Memorials, recommended that all papers from Provincial Board of Health presented be referred to the local Board of Health, and that in the matter of petition of James McMullen, et al, notice to all parties be given by the clerk as the council direct.

The Finance committee report recommended that the following accounts be paid, viz.: C. W. Rutledge, assessment roll, etc., \$12.60; the clerk registrar's fee, \$15.40; Jane Thompson, bread to Mrs. Hanley, \$5.40.

Mr. Damude introduced bylaw No. 484 to appoint overseers, fenceviewers and poundkeepers for 1892, which was read a first time.

Mr. Damude moved, seconded by Mr. McMullen, that bylaw 484 be now read a second time. Carried.

Bylaw 484 was read a second time. Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. Pedlar, that Council go into committee of the whole on bylaw 484, Mr. Damude in the chair.

Committee arose, the reeve in the chair. Mr. Damude presented bylaw

484 as filled up in committee of the whole, and asked leave for the committee to sit again.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that this council take supervision of the roads in this township for the current year as follows: Ward No. 1, D. McMillan; Ward No. 2, T. Kells; Ward No. 3, S. Damude; Ward No. 4, S. Pedlar; and that all orders for payments of work or otherwise, be made in the open council. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. Damude, that S. Pedlar and D. McMillan be added to the Road and Bridge Committee. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that the report of committee on printing be adopted, and that W. H. Thurston be paid balance of his account, \$5 25. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kells, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that report of Road and Bridge committee be adopted. Carried.

Mr. McMillan moved, seconded by Mr. Damude, the report of committee on Petitions and Communications be adopted. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that the report of Finance committee be adopted, and the following amounts be paid: C. W. Rutledge, \$12.60; W. J. Bellamy, registrar's fees, 1891, \$15.40; Mrs. Thompson, \$5.40. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. Pedlar, that this Council cannot entertain the demand of Joseph Watson for refund of taxes on lot 36, concession 2nd, S. D. R., he having failed to establish any claim. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that the communication of David Black be laid over for consideration. Carried.

Mr. Kells moved, seconded by Mr. Damude, that the reeve provide proper lights for the Town Hall. Carried.

On motion the Council adjourned to meet in the Town Hall, Flesherton, on the first Monday in April, 1892.
