We notice that Mr. Geo. Parks has returned to his duties at the station. Evidently the charge on which he was taken to Owen Sound did not prove to be so serious as was supposed.

Our genial host of the Flesherton hotel went out to Eugenia to fish on Monday. Some wag, it is alleged, untied his horse, which came all the way home of its own accord. Dan got a chance to ride home behind some one else's horse. He says he caught three fish, but could not produce the evidence when asked to do so.

A Sensation.
Eugenia had a big sensation last week. Word arrived in Flesherton on Thursday evening that two boys, sons of Mr. Fenwick, the miller, aged respectively 14 and 13, had been swept over the falls to their death. Friday morning the news was still further confirmed, when the mail carrier brought in the full particulars. It appears that the boys had started to gather sap on the mountain, and on their way had to cross a bridge made of planks and slabs, which spans the river between the grist mill flume and saw mill. Each boy carried a pail. About five o'clock on Thursday Mr. Fenwick found the two pails on this bridge, on either side of a yawning hole where a plank had been broken, and fallen into the rapid current below. The inference was plain that the boys had fallen through, and had probably been carried over the 82-foot fall below. An alarm was given and the whole male population of Eugenia turned out to search for the bodies. This search was kept up until darkness set in, and resumed again in the early morning and continued until eleven o'clock a. m. without success. Men risked their lives in the chilling waters to restore the bodies to the bereaved parents, but they could not be found. About 11.30 on Friday word was received that the boys had been seen travelling towards Kimberley the evening before, and the search was abandoned. On Friday afternoon some half dozen vehicles went out from Flesherton to view the scene and render assistance if necessary, but their services were not required. To make a long story short, the boys were found by their father out at Dundalk, in Collierville township,

where they had engaged themselves to a farmer, one for two dollars per month and the other for his board. They were brought home. The young rascals had laid their plans well, and imposed upon a sympathetic community to the extent of a day's suspension of business, not to speak of the exposure. They said they wanted to make their parents, who had chastised them, believe they were drowned, but did not think people would go to the bother of looking for them.

The scene of the above, though never, we believe, proving fatal, was on one occasion many years ago the scene of a casualty which nearly caused the loss of a life. A young girl whose name we have forgotten, while crossing the river on a plank bridge fell into the swift flowing water, and was swept down stream towards the brink of the falls. A short distance above the precipice she succeeded in catching and clinging to a boulder until her screams attracted the attention of Dr. Alexander Purdy, who succeeded in rescuing her.
