Mr. Stuart spent four days last week at the Tavistock dairy school getting some new wrinkles in the manufacture of cheese. Mr. Stewart says:

Dr. Sexton's sermons in the Methodist church on Sunday last were very much enjoyed by large congregations. His lecture on Monday evening on "The folly of Atheism and the fallacy of Agnosticism" was a grand exposition of the question, and the Dr., to the satisfaction of a great majority of his hearers, succeeded in placing christianity where it ought to be, upon the same plane as any of the sciences.
