The ministerial session was held during the afternoon. In the evening a program consisting of excellent short addresses by a number of the clergymen interspersed with music by the choir was rendered and much appreciated by the audience.

On Wednesday the following lay delegates were present: J. W. Armstrong, Flesherton; J. D. Sloan, Eugenia; C. C. James, Priceville; George Nixon, Dundalk; J. M. Clarke, Melancthon; C. W. Rutledge, Markdale; D. R. Ellis, Euphrasia; James Bowes, Esq., Walters Falls, and E. Ewart, Holland Centre.

Rev. J. Pepper was elected secretary and Rev. F. W. Thompson assistant.

The statistics showed a gratifying increase both in the membership and the connexional funds of the district. The following boundary changes were recommended, viz: To put Bethel appointment, Dundalk circuit, into Melancthon and send a young man to assist the superintendent of Melancthon circuit; to unite Euphrasia and Eugenia, making one circuit, with Kimberley as the head, to be called Kimberley circuit, and to have an ordained minister and a colleague; to add Pleasant Valley, Holland township, to Holland Centre, and to transfer Zion appointment, Walters Falls circuit, to Owen Sound district.
