He was the father of a large family, two sons and two daughters are still living, and four daughters are dead. He was a kind neighbor and a firm friend. In politics he was a lifelong Conservative. The interment took place at Laitio cemetery, and the funeral was a very large one.

A Correction Corrected.

BINNIE VS. WAUGHOB.

To the Editor of The Advance.

DEAR SIR-As the 170 side road and Durham Road are one and the same it is no correction of your first report in the case of Binnie vs. Waughob to say in your second report that the Durham road is the governing line. There is no modification in that statement. Your first report stated that each party paid his own costs; your second report states there are "no costs to either party." As these statements mean precisely the same thing, how is the first report modified by the second? Your first report said nothing of Traynor's starting point, hence there is no modification of the first report by the second, as to that.

Unfortunately for Mr. Binnie it does not make the slightest difference to him where the starting point at the front is, or that Traynor's line is some 14 feet north of the present fence, because to "correctly state the effect of the judgment of the learned Chief Justice" he does not get any point of these 14 feet. What he does get, if the judgment is allowed to stand, is an almost valueless strip of land of about three quarters of an acre in the rear as intimated in your first report and the probability is, Mr. Binnie does not wish to purchase any more land, front or rear, at the same price.
