Artemesia Council.
The regular monthly meeting of Artemesia township council was held in the Town Hall on Monday last. In the absence of the reeve Dupty Reeve Kells occupied the chair. Other members present, Messrs. McMillan, Pedlar and

Damude. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The following letters were read: From H. Weber, asking for extension of time for building; from I. B. Lucas, re Donald Black's claim for a horse; from County Clerk, re amount required to be raised for current expenses and legislative school grant; from S. J. Parker, re certain lots still vested in the Crown; from S. J. Parker, re lands liable to be sold for taxes in Artemesia; from J. W. Armstrong, treasurer, statement of township monies on hand up to Aug. 1st, '92, showing a balance of \$373.89; from the Clerk, re taxes on park lot F., Flesher's survey, Flesherton. Bills were presented as follows: Wm. Davis, 181 loads of gravel \$9.05; John Hargrave, 100 loads gravel, \$5; S. Thompson, 70 loads gravel, \$3.50; Robt. McGruther, 94 loads gravel, \$4.70; Thos. and George Ludlow, re-paving bridge and culvert on town line Proton and Artemesia, \$7; W. H. Thurston, printing 200 voters lists, \$62.

The following bylaws were introduced: No. 485, to levy school trustees' rates; No. 487, to appoint collectors, viz., Messrs. Hassard, Blair, John Wright, sr., and J. B. Sloan; No. 486, to levy rates for county and township purposes; No. 488, to repeal Bylaw No. 466 and define roadway at the new deviation. These were all read the third time in Committee of the Whole, with the exception of No. 485, and 488, the third reading of which was left over until next meeting.

The following pay sheets were submitted and approved: Commissioner Ward No. 1, \$173.25; Ward No. 2, \$43.35; Ward 3, \$82.75; Ward 4, \$131.29.

Pedlar—Damude.—That whereas the council of the township of Glenelg has given notice to this council of their intention to expend \$35 on town line Artemesia and Glenelg, therefore be it resolved that this council is satisfied with Glenelg council expending the said \$35 on the road cited in their communication, and will give them credit for said amount on account of \$51 expended by this council on town line from the south side of the corporation of Markdale to 110 side road, con. 1, W. T. & S. R., and \$20.60 expended by Mr. D. McMillan on town line between 3rd and 4th cons., north D. R., the Clerk to forward copy of this resolution to the council of Glenelg.—Carried.

Moved by D. McMillan, seconded by S. Pedlar, that Mr. McMillan, commissioner of Ward No. 1, is hereby instructed to see to having bridge over Saugoen, river opposite lot 9, con. 3, S. D. R. repaired.—Carried.

Damude—Pedlar.—That the communication of I. B. Lucas, Esq., re Donald Black's claim, be laid on the table and that the Clerk notify Mr. Lucas accordingly.—Carried.

Pedlar—McMillan.—That the commissioner of Ward No. 4 arrange to meet the members of Euphrasia Council on town line and examine bridge re deviation near 14th concession Artemesia, reported to be unsafe, and make such repairs as may be needed to make it safe for public travel.—Carried.

McMillan—Pedlar.—That the Artemesia Agricultural Society be given \$25, their usual grant for the year 1892.—Carried.

Pedlar—McMillan.—That the road commissioner for Ward No. 3 see to repairing road on back line east above Little Mill—repairs not to exceed \$15.00.—Carried.

Pedlar—Damude.—That three dollars be accepted from W. K. Flesher as taxes in full for Park Lot F, Flesher's survey, and that the Clerk notify County Treasurer to erase all taxes now charged in his books against said Park Lot, he having been assessed on N. R. Roll in error.—Carried.


Damude—Pedlar.—That the following parties be paid for gravel supplied to pathmasters for improvements on roads: John Hargrave, \$5.00; R. McGruther, \$4.70; Wm. Davis, \$9.63; S. A. Thompson, \$3.50.—Carried.

Damude—Pedlar.—That the following accounts be paid, viz.:—Thos. Ludlow, new culvert on town line between Artemesia and Proton, \$5.00; Geo. Ludlow, repairing culvert, \$2.00; W. H. Thurston, printing voters' lists, \$62.00; Thomas Kells, for expenses attending Meaford's appeal two days, \$6.25.—Carried.

Pedlar—McMillan.—That the Clerk correspond with R. P. Legate as to his account of \$9.43 for lumber, &c., supplied to Jas. Hemphill, the same not having been authorized by this Council.—Carried.

Pedlar—McMillan.—That the Reeve and Councillor Damude and the Clerk be a committee to see after taking bonds from the several Collectors and report at next Council session.—Carried.
Council adjourned.
