**MEAFORD AND THE APPEAL.**

The Meaford Mirror of last week attempts to defend the course taken by that town in its recent appeal and makes use of some ridiculously false arguments in order to bolster up its side of the question. It says The Advance is "too ready to jump at conclusions without stopping to post himself in the particulars." Unfortunately for Meaford, however, we are only too well posted on this question, and might have advanced the conclusions and evidence arrived at in a more forcible manner than we did, but did not wish to unnecessarily "pile it on" when the town had just emerged from such an exceedingly small-ended horn. We said the town of Meaford had lost the good will of the other municipalities by her action, and so she has, notwithstanding the Mirror's denial. Some of the Mirror's statements are so conspicuously untrue that we are forced to believe its editor has fallen into the naughty habit of "jumping at conclusions" with a vengeance, or that it has no due regard for the truth. It exhibits a bitter, bilious spirit, which, under the circumstances, should, perhaps, be charitably over-looked. Here is a specimen:

"The Equalization Committee unanimously agreed that the assessment should be reduced, and their decision should have settled the matter but for the tactics of the representatives of the southern municipalities, who, in order to relieve themselves of a surplus load of bile, put the county to the unnecessary expense of holding a court for the hearing of an appeal which, by their action, they eventually admitted was just and proper."

The above is a tissue of misleading statements from beginning to end. The Equalization Committee did not unanimously agree, in fact it was carried by a very narrow majority, and when the matter was brought up in county council, although the recommendation of the committee was adopted, still there was a large amount of discontent. It was represented by the reeve of Meaford (a gentleman who by the way is held in much respect) that Meaford had met many heavy losses by fire, and the matter was passed in council through simple charity on the part of the members. Under such circumstances the "southern municipalities" who are assessed equally as high, were perfectly justified in entering a vigorous protest, and they happily succeeded in getting a compromise without wasting valuable time in submitting evidence to the court. This is what the Mirror calls "relieving themselves of a surplus load of bile." Perhaps it will surprise the Mirror to learn that the township of Osprey is assessed twice as high for county purposes as it is for municipal, and Artemesia more than two-thirds as high again. Other townships we cannot speak for, but believe they are also assessed in about the same proportion. The result does not prove that the representatives, by their action, admitted that the appeal was just and proper—far from it. The above quotation proves that the Mirror is not extremely happy over the result, showing conclusively that the "southern municipalities" in their opposition to brigandage got a little bit the better of the brigand. If these municipalities had only stood idly by with their eyes shut

while Meaford rifled their pockets, what big tears of gratitude would have welled down the Mirror's cheeks! What chunks of fun the Meaford people would have had!

When we say the people of Meaford are ungrateful we mean every word of it. They now receive back from the County nearly one quarter of the taxes which they pay in. For their high school they receive about \$675 per annum out of the county funds! And yet the Mirror has the assurance to say: "The Advance makes some allusion to the liberality of the County Council in granting Meaford a high school, but forgets to add that we have had to pay for it, and that the school is a benefit to the whole county. Our people are prepared to pay for their educational advantages, but will never consent to be robbed for the benefit of other municipalities." Prepared to pay, indeed! Consent to be robbed! Then they should be made pay it. Either they should pay or pound a little common sense into the Mirror, which has shown itself in a ridiculous light. Read up the High School Act, Mr. Mirror, and you will find that every County council shall "collect from the municipalities composing the county the sum or sums for which the county is annually liable for the proportionate maintenance of county pupils, less the fees paid by county pupils as certified to the county treasurer by the high school board." This sum must be "an amount equal to the amount apportioned by the Minister of Education for each of such high schools." And yet Meaford people are prepared to pay all of this? What sublime nonsense! Clause 8 of the high school Act, which deals with the establishment of high schools, states clearly that "any county may in like manner discontinue, at the end of the current calendar year, any high school already established." This county gave Meaford her high school, it assists her largely in maintaining it, and receives nothing but ingratitude in return. If (as we state positively is the case) Meaford has not already lost the goodwill of the other municipalities she will very shortly if the Mirror is not held within bounds. We do not so much mind that paper exhibiting its sores, but would ask it in all fairness to "tell the truth and shame the devil." And let it remember that when a readjustment is made (which would be a piece of unnecessary trouble) the "southern municipalities" will decidedly be "in it." They want their assessments lowered and will succeed if Meaford does. Artemesia, which is taken as the basis of the county assessment, is over-assessed, and we therefore speak from knowledge when we say that a readjustment would leave the financial equilibrium about as it is at present.

Sir Daniel Wilson, the venerable president of Toronto University, the world-renowned philosopher and author, died at his home in Toronto on Saturday last, aged 76 years. It is but speaking weakly to say that the university has sustained a loss which it will be hard to replace by the death of its devoted president.

The newspapers of this county have been bothered to no end during the past two weeks by expectant candidates who were anxious to know whether they had passed the entrance examination or not. Pupils have been held in suspense for three weeks longer than they should have been, owing to the incapacity of the officials in this county. It is the same old story year after year, and it has now become such a bugbear that some measure of relief should be taken at once. More competent men should be appointed. It is not only a hardship, but a downright shame that pupils attending this examination are not sooner notified of their acceptance or refusal, so that they may prepare for the attendance at opening of high school. Other counties published the

result three weeks ago. After the complaints of the past two years it was thought an improvement would be made, but it has not. Now let the press of this county make it hot for the offenders.
