Will be Valuable.
Mr. John Boland, of Vandeleur, is one who is not easily discouraged. He believes in thoroughly proving whatever he takes in hand. The English two-rowed barley is his latest experiment, and in testing it he has discovered some peculiarities which are worthy of mention. While many farmers became discouraged with the first attempt Mr. Boland has grown it for the past three years, and has succeeded in growing this year about four acres of magnificent grain, many of the heads measuring five inches in length, filled with very large, plump and bright kernels. A strange fact in connection with this barley is that it is developing the valuable trait of ripening earlier every year, and this season is fully ten days earlier than it was three seasons ago. Mr. Boland is thoroughly satisfied that this barley will become a profitable variety for Ontario.

The Examinations.
Purely through an accident we are enabled to publish this week the result of the late entrance examinations held here and in Dundalk, without thanks to the officials in Owen Sound, who do not see fit to furnish the press with a copy of the result. These same officials will some day find that the newspapers are interested in their work, if they are not in the newspaper's.
